### LET'S TALK IT OVER

#### Speeding Is As Much A Threat As Was Congestion

Did it ever occur to you that serious traffic accidents do not occur in extremely congested "Traffic Areas"? The reason for this is that highway conditions compel car drivers to drive at low speeds. You get banged-up fenders and broken headlights, perhaps, in such areas, but rarely loss of life or even serious injuries. Summer Street between Queen Elizabeth Park and the new High School is an example.

Last year, with parking allowed opposite the school, traffic slowed down to a crawl, an inconvenience to the travelling public, we grant, but not a threat to life and limb. This year no parking is allowed in this area the street is clear, and already we have seen cars go through there at the noon hour a lot faster than the demands of safety allow.

A thoughtless boy or girl running out into the street would be in real danger. We are not arguing that parking should be allowed in that area. No doubt the prohibiting of parking there is a step in the right direction. Another very necessary step however, is the erecting of speed-limit signs and it might be a good idea for a policeman to use that new anti-speed gadgets up around the schools at noon hour and around 3.30.

We have seen at least a half dozen cars whose drivers would

have added something to the town's coffers if their speeds had been timed.

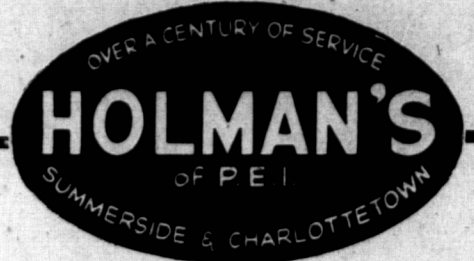
