It is greatly to be hoped that the experiment of shipment to England now being tried may succeed, and thus afford our farmers remunerative prices.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.

A meeting of Ottawa Conservatives will be held on the 23rd inst., to make arrangements for a banquet to Sir John A. McDonald.

SYDNEY, Oct. 16.

Murray Dodd and Dr. McLeod (Ministerial), and N. L. McKay (Grit), were nominated for the vacant seat in the Commons to day.

GREAT BRITAIN.

MANCHESTER, ENG., Oct. 17.

Lord Salisbury made a speech at a banquet to-night, in which he remarked that the Opposition leaders after attacking his circular in reply to the San Stefano treaty, and after having permitted Mr. Gladstone to expend the limited resources of his sophistry upon it, had now veered round and asserted that the Government had not acted to the circular by opposing Russia. Lord Salisbury recapitulated and justified the policy of the Government point by point, strong hospitality to Russia being very noticeable throughout his remarks. In regard to the fact that Turkey had not occupied the Balkans he said: "In the present state of the Russian Empire, Turkey has no reason to expect aggressions. The badness of the Government of Turkey or any other country would never justify us in handing over great strategic positions to any power whose aggressions threaten the happiness and independence of the world; but there are other points of the Treaty of Berlin besides the occupation of the Balkans. If you do not trust a Turkish sentinel on the ramparts, you may trust an Austrian sentinel at the door. Since the occupation of Novi Bazaar, the advance of the Russians beyond the Balkans and the Danube is impossible. In the independence and strength of Austria rests the last hope of European stability. If the assertion of the newspapers, that a defensive alliance between Austria and Germany, proves to be true, all who value the peace of Europe will hail it as glad tidings of great joy."

CONDENSED DESPATCHES.

Parnell, speaking at the Newry meeting, announced that he was going to America in November.

Louis A. Spach, the author, is dead. A Berlin correspondent telegraphs that it is stated that the British Government refused to discuss with Russia questions relating to the Afghan War.

A Capetown despatch says operations against chief Secocoeni will begin immediately.

The committee of the Federal Council of Foreign affairs met in Berlin on Thursday. The event is unusual. Special correspondents conjecture that the Government had something important to communicate concerning negotiations with the Vatican or relations with foreign Powers.

Three Afghan chiefs are now imprisoned at Cabul. The British military committee will meet immediately.
