RECEPTION TO THE BOYS.

Programme at The Square—Route of the Procession.

At the meeting in the City Council Chamber last night arrangements were completed for the reception of the returning soldiers. Captain D. L. Hooper was selected to marshal the procession, the route of which will beup Great George Street to Richmond, along Richmond to Prince, up Prince to Kent Street, along Kent to Queen, down Queen to platform on the South side of the Square. Here an address to the soldiers will be read by Premier Farquharson, which will be replied to by Rev. T. F. Fallerton and Lieut. Macdonald. Short addresses will also be given by Lieutenant-Governor McIntyre, Chief Justice Sullivan, Col. Moore and a representative of the City Council. The money that is now being collected for the "boys" by Mr. Geo. E. Hughes will be presented by that gentleman yesterday afternoon \$75 was collected for that fund. When the procession reaches the platform on the square the band will play "Praise God from whom all blessings flow" the audience joining in the chorus. Arrangements have been made to have the address and speech-making in the park if the weather should be unfavorable. Citizens generally are asked to illuminate their buildings, more especially along the line of march.
