Press Coverage Praised

John Kennedy Assassination

GEN PRESS COVERAGE
NEW YORK (AP)—Wes Gallagher, general manager of the Associated Press, said in a special report, "It is clear that the assassination of President Kennedy 'saw the press rise to its finest hour in keeping the world informed.'"
Gallagher said news coverage of the tragedy "demonstrated the best in everyone and it covered the event."

The Associated Press and its members threw more resources into the covering of the assassination, Gallagher said, than any other general news event in its history. Gallagher said the press coverage of the report, noting a net gain of 727 newspapers and broadcasters receiving AP news around the world, was mailed to members in advance of the Associated Press annual meeting here April 20. Present at the meeting was the principal speaker.
Gallagher's report dealt in part with some critics who attacked the press for its coverage of the assassination and funeral.

"Criticism revolved around the reporting of reporters, cameramen and broadcasters, the relatively quick designation of Lee Harvey Oswald as the accused assassin and Oswald's own murder a few hours later."

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are the dealer, neither side vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following five hands?

1. ♠AQ32 ♥9-Q532 ♣AJ74
2. ♠A35 ♥Q5 ♣A34 ♠KQ852
3. ♠AQ753 ♥Q96432 ♠A ♠A
4. ♠A378 ♥Q532 ♠KQ92 ♠AQ3

1. One club. It is generally best with 4-4-1 hands to open the bidding in the suit beneath the singleton, but not necessarily when the suit is too weak to bid. In such cases the most suitable suit when the limit is named first. The bidding therefore opened with a club, and the partner responded with a heart. The intention is to rebid one spade over the expected response of a heart or a diamond.

2. One trump. This is the best bid available. It is announced in one hand 16 to 18 high-card points, normal distribution and well-developed strength.

An opening club bid would not describe the hand as well as such a bid could be made with any distribution and with high-card points. Furthermore, an accurate rebid after partner responded with one in any suit would be impossible. The one-trump opening tells the story as well as it can be told.

3. One spade. In general, a six-card suit is named ahead of a five-card suit, but when the

The press coverage of the assassination and its background shut off rumors which could have fueled the hatreds in the point of possible violence."

Gallagher said all media were equally responsible for applying pressure to questions quickly and accurately.

"Legal critics who sought to treat the death of a president in the same framework as an ordinary murder ignored the realities of the situation," Gallagher said.

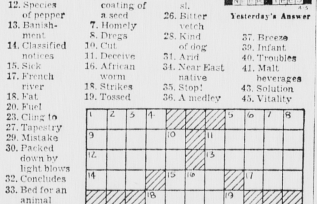
Should the press be asked to share the blame when law police work made it possible for an outsider to kill Oswald?
Gallagher noted that a team of Associated Press top writers and editors came to the scene of the death of the president in Dallas. The Torch is Passco, reporting to Viet Nam, which he called the biggest story in the foreign field, Gallagher said.

"During the year," he said, "some reporters and columnists, who flew into Viet Nam a couple of weeks, raised questions and insinuations about the reporting and analytical ability of the resident correspondents. While much of the criticism was not directly aimed at the press, it tended to draw up an indictment against all correspondents regularly based there."

Subsequent events, including overthrow of the Dem government and instability of its successor, bore out the day-by-day reporting of our men on the spot."

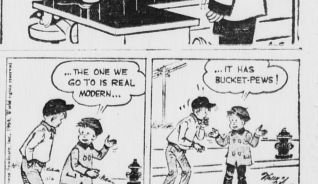
