

# Yankees Edge Braves To Even Up The Series 3-3

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Bauer's homer that was only inches fair and Bob Turley's brilliant four-hit pitching evened the world series at three games each Wednesday with a 3-2 New York Yankee victory over Milwaukee.

Turley threw a masterful game, blending his zipping fast ball with a slow curve and slider to save the Yanks from elimination. The reformed scatter-arm right-hander, who failed to last two innings in Milwaukee, ended the game with a flourish by starting a double play on a ball hit back to the box by Wes Covington. He walked only two and fanned eight Braves.

Yogi Berra's 10th world series homer with Enos Slaughter on base in the third inning gave the Yanks a 2-0 edge on starter Bob Buhl.

Frank Torre got one run back for the Braves with a fifth-inning homer into the lower right field stands and Hank Aaron smashed a 420-foot drive into the Braves' bullpen in left to tie the score in the seventh.

So it was 2-2 when Bauer came up in the seventh with nobody on base.

Ernie Johnson, who had relieved Buhl in the third, worked the count on Bauer to 2-2 before the Yankee right fielder drove the ball down the left field foul line. It hit the foul screen and bounced back on the field in a moment of confusion.

Foul line umpire Frank Secory of the National League and third base umpire Joe Paparella of the American indicated a home run.

The ball had struck the screen that jut out from the foul pole into fair territory to help the umpires call borderline drives.

This was a titanic battle of home runs and fine pitching, played before 61,408 fans at Yankee Stadium in perfect baseball weather.

Turley, a 27-year-old right-hander, used the same no-wind-up delivery made famous by Don Larsen in his perfect game last year. The big man with the boyish face conquered his control trouble this season and came up with a new pitch—the slider.

Each time he prepared to pitch, Turley shrugged his shoulders, and took a deep breath. He has had a tendency to hurry himself on the mound.

It worked against the eager Braves who now have had a good whiff of that big \$9,100 cheque that awaits each of them if they win.

Ten times Turley went to three balls on a hitter. One was a 3-2 pitch to Torre for the homer in the fifth. Another was a 3-1 de-

livery to Aaron in the seventh. The first man he walked was Felix Mantilla on 3-2 in the eighth and he lost Eddie Mathews on four straight balls leading off the ninth.

**BORE DOWN**  
After Turley passed Mathews to open the ninth, putting the tying run on base, he really bore down on Aaron, who fouled one and then took two strikes. Covington saw a fast ball and curve slide past him before he bounced back to Turley for the game-ending double play.

Larsen, winner of the third game of this series in relief, will be the Yankee starter in today's seventh game at the stadium. It was Larsen, of course, who threw the perfect game against Brooklyn, Oct. 4, 1956.

Warren Spahn's illness forced manager Fred Haney to call on Lew Burdette, already a two-time winner, to work the seventh. The fidgety right-hander, who shut out the Yanks 1-0 Monday at Milwaukee, will be working with only two days rest.

For the second straight game, the Yanks had to play without Mickey Mantle, who injured his shoulder at Milwaukee Saturday.

In addition to Spahn, Milwaukee had a cripple in second baseman Red Schoendienst. Although Red worked out Wednesday and report his strained muscle greatly improved, he didn't see action.

Bauer's homer stretched his hitting streak to 13 consecutive series games—seven in 1956 and six this year. That tied the record held jointly by Frank Schulte of the 1906-10 Chicago Cubs and Harry Hooper of the 1915-18 Boston Red Sox.

**10th HOMER**  
Berra's 10th series homer pulled him up even with Brooklyn's Duke Snider among active players. It also tied Lou Gehrig and left the three men in a second-place tie behind Babe Ruth's 15. Yogi also set another record by appearing in his 53rd series game, more than any other man in the long history of baseball.

Wildness again plagued Buhl, the Braves' 18-game winner, just as it had when he faced Turley in the third game last Saturday.

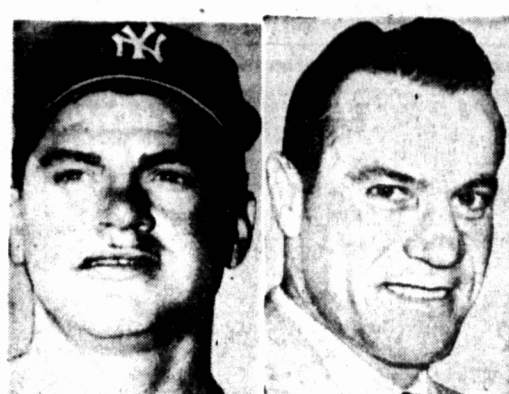
He allowed four hits, including Berra's homer, and had walked four and uncorked one wild pitch before he gave way to Johnson. He also struck out four Yanks.

Johnson baffled the Yanks during most of his 4-1-3 inning stay. He gave up only two hits, walked none and struck out five. However, the big hit was Bauer's homer that assured the series of a seventh game. Don McMahon pitched the eighth inning.

The Braves ripped off two

double plays, boosting their series total to 10. The first came when Harry Simpson, a hitting flop, struck out and Jerry Lumpe was doubled up stealing in the second.

Wes Covington, who made a great running catch against game, came up with another fine play in the eighth. Berra had Bobby Shantz in the second doubled and then third on Gil McDougald's sacrifice. Lumpe hit a high fly to the left field corner. Berra tagged up and headed for the plate only to be cut down by Covington's perfect no-bounce throw to catcher Del Rice.

**Ice Making To Begin At Civic Stadium Very Soon**

Ice making at Civic Stadium will begin on November 1st it was learned yesterday from Charles Hogan manager of Summerside Civic Stadium. Mr. Hogan said that the first hockey practice for the Summerside Aces will be about the third or fourth of November with public skating beginning about November 6th or 7th.

Officials of the company who installed the ice making plant are expected in Summerside shortly to check over the equipment in accordance with the terms of the contract under which the plant was installed.

He said that a meeting of the Sunday Night Skating Club will be called for next Tuesday evening at the stadium to reorganize the club.

Meetings will also be held in the near future with rural hockey teams desiring to enter a league similar to the one conducted last year.

Other meetings will be held with representatives from such centers as Richmond, Wellington, Miscouche Kensington Bedeque and Crapaud with the idea that these centers will also have a league and use the stadium for their games until natural ice is available.

Roller skating will continue at the stadium until the end of October and the last rock and roll dance will be held this Saturday night. It is hoped, he said, to bring in the last wrestling show of the season on the 25th of October.

The final fight card of the year will be on October 18th with what is expected to be the greatest scrap of the year, when Bud Ramsey, P.E.I. - N.B. Welterweight Champion accepts the challenge of Walter "Peanuts" Arsenault for a title fight.

Also on the same card will return, a winner take all, match between Wendell Oliver of Alberta and Urban Rogers of Indian River.

Another match will also be sending Len Durelle, cousin of Yvon Durelle, British Lightweight Champion, against Francis "Peanuts" Arsenault older brother of Walter "Peanuts" Arsenault.

## Turley Lived Up To His Name

NEW YORK (AP)—Bullet Bob Turley lived up to his name for seven innings Wednesday when he whipped Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, to tie the world series for New York Yankees. It was Turley's first victory in a world series.

"But I wasn't throwing any bullets in the last two or three innings," he laughed happily in the clubhouse later. "I was using a sinker mostly with some curves thrown in."

"I'll tell you one thing, though. I didn't throw a changeup the entire game. I wasn't taking any chances."

A soft-spoken right-hander, Turley said this was the biggest victory since he started pitching. Manager Casey Stengel was all praise for Turley although he said he had Whitey Ford ready and would have put the lefty ace in had Eddie Mathews come to bat in the eighth inning. But he didn't and that saved Turley.

## Places Title On The Line Tonight

MONCTON (CP)—Norman Gautreau of Moncton places his Maritime welterweight crown on the line here tonight in a scheduled 10-round bout against Keith Paris of Halifax.

Gautreau wrested the title from Paris, who has won 60 of his 70 fights, here Aug. 29 in a bitter 10-round battle. Gautreau won by a decision.

Paris is expected to weigh around 146 and Gautreau about 144.

"Hell, skip," he said. "I'll have all winter to rest up."

## Don Larsen To Pitch Today

NEW YORK (AP)—Don Larsen, whose perfect no-hitter made world series history last year, will probably start for New York Yankees against Milwaukee Braves in today's deciding game.

Backing him up, said a jubilant Casey Stengel, will be outh little Casey Ford, the left-hander who has won one and lost one so far in this series.

"That was a rough one," cracked manager Stengel after his Yankees had evened the series at 3-3.

"It's a good thing we got Hank Bauer's homer. They didn't have no pine dither, even if they had of won."

Stengel was proud of Bob Turley, his big fireballing right-hander.

"He certainly pitched hard. All they did was hit two balls on him that couldn't be caught." (The homers of Hank Aaron and Frank Torre).

"I was going to pitch Ford tomorrow," said Stengel, "but I had him in the bull pen those last two innings, so it probably will be Larsen, but Ford will be ready, too, if I need him."

"The reason I put Ford in the bullpen at the end was to get those left hand hitters, if we needed it. In the ninth, after Turley walked Ed Mathews, he pitched as hard as I have ever seen him throw," Stengel said.

Turley got Hank Aaron on a called third strike and made Wes Covington hit into a double play.

## Burdette Goes For The Braves

NEW YORK (AP)—Lew Burdette, who has scalped the Yankees twice, will be on the mound with only two days rest and 21-game winner Warren Spahn will be in the bullpen for Milwaukee today in the seventh and decisive world series game.

Fred Haney, crazy manager of the Braves, made the announcement with a ring of confidence Wednesday after the Braves had bowed to the world champions in a battle of home runs 3-2 which knotted the series at 3-3.

"There wasn't much we could have done about today's game," Haney said philosophically. "Those home runs (by Yogi Berra and Hank Bauer) licked us. I don't know of a thing I would have done differently."

"But tomorrow is another day and we'll throw everything at them. Certainly I'm still convinced we'll win."

Haney was asked if he was concerned about using Burdette with only two days' rest.

"Not at all," he replied. "He's done it before. He's strong and he can do it."

Spahn, who has won one and lost one in the series, remained in his hotel room Wednesday combating a slight cold. But he said he would be okay for the final game.

Comlan called it a ball and both catcher Del Rice of the Braves and pitcher Ernie Johnson registered mild protests, arguing that Bauer had swung.

"Of course, the half-swing call was important. It's always good to be ahead of a batter and I would have thrown him something different."

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
