Editorial Notes.

The Grit split at the West has resulted in placing three candidates in opposition to Hon. R. B. Reid.

The Herald reappeared on Wednesday evening—looking well after its long rest. It is interesting to note that the articles are well written and are in the right strain.

Hon. David Laird, ex Governor of the Northwest Territories, etc., etc., etc., has been in the field assisting Mr. Mann. At Brackley Point, one of his strongholds he addressed a few evenings ago, for an hour and a quarter, a meeting which included about seven electors. How a e the mighty fallen!

The value to farmers of "home industry" is becoming apparent now that prices are down in the Old Country. Owing to the activity in our mines and factories, resulting from the advantage taken of the National Policy, there is at present a fair demand for Oats in the sister Maritime Provinces.

The activity of the Government Press is the Pioneer's reason for supporting the men who go for retaining our useless Legislative Council. But as the Presbyterian has taken no part in the canvass, and as the Patriot says that, so far as this question is concerned, THE EXAMINER is desperately weak, the Pioneer's reason must be worthless.

The "Cad" of James Johnston, Esquire, to the Electors of the First Legislative Council District of Queen's County—unlike that of his political opponent—very clear and very much to the point. Mr. Johnston advocates a reduction of the Legislature, and protection to property-holders. He is a man of unblemished character and will do, to the best of his ability, just what he says he will do. That's just what the taxpayers want. Give him a vote.

The Patriot tries to show that because a few "loose fish" in Charlottetown and Summerside have the right to vote, and because the votes of these "loose fish" may be bought, the property holders of this country have not all the influence in the Legislature. Well, look to the results. Charlottetown is now represented by Hon. Neil McLeod and Jonathan Blake, Esq., and Summerside by Hon. J. Lefurgey and Dr. Gillis; and Charlottetown and Summerside have, with all their "loose fish" always been represented by men of property. Suppose the defeated candidates had succeeded in catching the "loose fish," the result would still be the same—the men elected would still have been property-holders, and have had a large interest in maintaining the rights of property. Now, is it to be imagined that these men, once elected, would pay more attention to the representations of the "loose fish" who voted for them, than to their supporters who own property? Surely the question need not be asked. In Charlottetown and Summerside, as in all the country districts, the men of property have, we repeat, "all the influence in the Legislature."

At the Thanksgiving Service held yesterday in the Prince Street Methodist Church, the Rev. Professor Burwash preached a very seasonable sermon on behalf of the Methodist Dorcas Society of this city. His text was "The poor ye have always with you," and his theme the claims which those in indigent circumstances have upon those who through a favoring Providence are lifted above want. The preacher spoke in the strongest terms against the practice of indiscriminate giving, as fostering pauperism and encouraging imposters. He also expressed his great surprise at the number of children who accost pedestrians at almost every step they take through the city, asking for cents, and recommended that they be made to earn their money before receiving it. The Dorcas Society made diligent enquiry into the necessities of those to whom it gave relief, and therefore commanded the confidence of those who had the means to give, but not the opportunity to ascertain the needs of the applicant. An earnest appeal was responded to by a handsome collection for the poor.

The tea meeting and concert yesterday in the Market Hall, on behalf of the B. C. Church, was a complete success which was well merited. About 600 persons were present and spent a most enjoyable evening. The ladies deserve great credit for the very sumptuous spread they provided for the public. The ladies who gave the tables were Mrs. J. W. Pickard, Mrs. Cook, Mrs. Tremaine, Mrs. Worth, Mrs. Toombs, Mrs. S. B. Jones, Mrs. Pickard, Mrs. Allen, Mrs. P. Pickard, Mrs. J. Knight, Mrs. W. Knight, Mrs. B. Pickard, Mrs. N. Rattenbury, and Mrs. A. Down. The Misses Knight, Pickard and Worth displayed a very pretty collection of flowers, while Miss Ferguson served as Rebecca at the Well. The young men were also quite active in the work assigned them, under the leadership of Messrs. Pickard and Howe.

(Editorial Correspondence of the "Church Guardian.")

REGINA.—Appointment of Rev. Alfred Osborne of Charlottetown, P. E. I.—The Ven Archdeacon Pukham visited Regina on Sunday, 2nd Oct., and held the first Church of England services there, morning and evening in the Royal Hotel. As so well known, Regina is elected as the capital of the new Province.

It is about 400 miles from Winnipeg to the Wascana River. On the 20th August there was one solitary tent, on the 20th October there was a population of 800, with two doctors, six lawyers, eight hotels, five newspapers, one jeweller and a large number of other stores. Streets 100 feet wide are laid out. The Archdeacon explained at the morning service the arrangements and work of the Diocese, and in the evening preached to a large room full. Much interest was excited, and after the service \$500 was at once offered for the first year towards a clergyman's school building, which was started at once. The Rev. Archdeacon is a Churchman, and we have a good representation of Church people. At the meeting of the Mission Board on the following Tuesday, Rev. Alfred Osborne of Charlottetown, was recommended to the Bishop for appointment. Mr. Osborne will have a remarkable field. Brandon has grown in two years from nothing to be self-supporting and gives \$40 a year. Regina will grow even faster. The Board in view of the importance of the place gave their full grant of \$800 for one year, so that the salary will be \$100. We do not hesitate to say that if Mr. Osborne accepts, which there is every reason to believe he will, that in less than two years there will be a large and flourishing Church. Regina is destined soon to be not only the capital of a Province, but the seat of a Bishopric. The first collection ever taken, was for Home Missions and amounted to \$10.96.

We learn that the agent of the Duke of Manchester's Company has given five town lots for the Church at Regina to which Mr. Osborne has been called, and that a further sum of \$200 a year has been offered towards Mr. Osborne's salary.

SUPREME COURT.—The further hearing of the Summerside Scott Act case was, on Monday, postponed until the 30th inst. A rule was granted on the application of Murnaghan to show cause why a *certiorari* should not issue to remove the conviction before Alexander Hayden and Peter McGowan, J. P.'s for Queen's County.

WEEK OF PRAYER.—The second Sunday of November and the week following having been set apart for special prayer, on behalf of Y. M. C. Associations throughout the world, special services will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, in this city, on Sunday afternoon, at four o'clock, and each evening during the week, from eight to nine o'clock.

At one o'clock, on Wednesday morning, a young woman named Mary Munroe was arrested while wandering through the streets with a child in her arms. She was homeless and without means. She was taken before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning, but, being unable to tender her any official assistance, ordered that she be discharged from custody.

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A CORRESPONDENT at Montague writes (Nov. 7):—"This morning Constable Weatherly, assisted by four special constables, arrested two of the most daring outlaws in this County, viz: Joseph and Annanias Campbell, and lodged them in jail. A few days ago Weatherly arrested Joseph, on a warrant of commitment under the Canada Temperance Act, and Annanias attacked him and rescued the prisoner. When Joseph was arrested this morning he made a desperate fight, and before he was overpowered he fired two shots of a revolver, which passed through the skirt of Weatherly's coat.

Mr. JOHN McMASTERS met with a serious accident on board the Steamer "Heather Belle" yesterday. While coming from Orwell he observed a seal swimming in the Bay close to the boat. Musket in hand he concluded to salute his sealship. But John was unfortunate. In loading the gun he did not take the necessary precaution to put a wad in after the bullet and it shot forward from the muzzle with the force of powder. The consequence was that on John's mapping the trigger the gun exploded, and a part of the stock came in contact with his hand, injuring it seriously.

YESTERDAY forenoon, Chief Engineer Large called out the different fire companies of the city for practice. The fire bell rang at 10 o'clock sharp, and the companies, on the alert, their respective rooms, made a bold dash for the tanks at Dawson's and McPhail's corners. The Hook and Ladder Company arrived first at Dawson's, and had an extension ladder run up the side of W. E. Dawson & Co.'s brick building in about four minutes from the first toll of the fire bell. Rollo engine next arrived at Dawson's and was closely followed by Tremont hand engine and Sisby and McPhail's. Tremont threw a good stream of water in three minutes, Sisby in five minutes, and Rollo in thirteen minutes. This is remarkably quick time, when it is known that the steam engines had cold water in the boilers and no steam up when the alarm was given. The steamer then made a quick shift to the Railway tank, where they spent a half hour throwing streams of water.
