Little Joe O'Brien Drives Scott Frost To Victory In Rich Yonkers Futurity Trot

YONKERS, N. Y., (AP)—The sensational three-year-old trotter Scott Frost sped in front all the way Thursday night to capture the \$73,840 Yonkers Futurity trot at Yonkers raceway and boosted his 1955 earnings to a one-year record for harness horses.

The winner's share of the purse, \$35,550.80, brought his earnings this year to \$118,651.80. He had a bankroll of \$83,101 before Thursday night's performance.

Driven by the little Canadian reinsman Joe O'Brien, Scott Frost easily whipped his seven rivals, finishing the mile and one sixteenth event two big lengths ahead of Galopone, who was his closest challenger in the Hambletonian Aug. 3 at Goshen, N. Y. Galopone, owned by William T. Maybury of Dexter, Me., whipped under the wire four lengths ahead of E. C. Moriarty's Black Rio, Wichita, Kas.

Scott Frost, the California whiz kid who hasn't lost a race this year, is owned by Sol Camp, a Shafter, Calif., potato and cotton farmer. Shafter also got fourth money in this richest night harness racing classic of all time Home Free, a stablemate of Scott Frost, bounced home fourth.

Time was 2:12 flat, compared with the world record of 2:10 1/5 made last year by Pronto Don, who was retired Wednesday as a 10-year-old.

CHICAGO (AP)—An injured foot Thursday put Swaps out of competition for an indefinite period—and clouded the hopes of fans of seeing him run against Nashua again this season.

The injury to his right front foot was announced by Rex C. Ellsworth, owner of the big California horse.

WOLVERHAMPTON Eng. (CP)—Bus drivers began a ban on all overtime here Thursday in protest against the employment of too many colored workers.

They said that while not wishing to impose a color bar they had insisted that the corporation should hire only 52 but that 68 were at present working on the buses.

It is the latest development in the general problem surrounding the immigration to Britain of thousands of colored people from British colonial islands in the West Indies and elsewhere. As British subjects they are free to enter Britain without restriction. Depressed economic conditions in their own territories have prompted many to come to England where jobs are plentiful.
