COUNCIL MAY SELL RURAL LINES

3 Canadian Minesweepers Due To Visit Summerside

Three ships of the First Canadian Minesweeping Squadron will be visiting Summerside the last four days of May. Mayor W. A. Currie stated last evening during the regular meeting of town council at which all councillors were present except Councillor Llewellyn Rogers who is confined to his home through an attack of the flu.

Mayor Currie stated that the ships will arrive on May 28th and remain until May 31st. The Squadron consists of HMCS Resolute, Quinte and Fundy. Each has a complement of five officers and 42 men.

Councillor W. E. MacCausland, chairman of the electric light committee gave a detailed report of the proposed sale of a portion of the town-owned rural lines and of the consideration being given to the purchase of a new generator for the electric light plant.

Councillor MacCausland stated his committee had met with A. D. Cameron, manager of Maritime Electric Company, who outlined a proposal upon which his company would be interested in the purchase of the lines, namely from St. Eleanor's corner easterly to Traveller's Rest corner, then southwesterly to Read's corner, southward to Summerside harbour, then westerly along the water front, then northward along a road to St. Leonard's Corner.

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(3) Sale price of these lines affords the town the dollars necessary for the cash purchase of an additional generator to meet the expansion of electrical requirements within the town.

(4) Lowering of overall maintenance costs.

Councillor MacCausland said serious consideration is being given to the purchase of a new generator providing suitable rates comparable with engine costs are available.

Under the present contract with Maritime Electric, which expires in May 1960, the annual service charge other than energy used are computed to cost, over the next four years, \$334,151.

This total figure is based on a 10 per cent natural increase for 1959, and seven per cent thereafter and include the presumption of 100 new homes per year for four years. Councillor MacCausland stated however that 10 per cent for this year was low as there has already been an increase during the first three months of this year of about 13 or 14 per cent.

As a result of these figures representation was made to Maritime Electric for a reduction in both service charge and energy rates. The proposal advanced gave no lowering of energy rate but did however lower the service charge over 2000 KW from \$4.75 per KW to \$2.70 per KW coupled with annual charges of \$1,500 to capitalize the tie line as well as a power factor penalty.

Analyzing their new proposal and keeping in mind power factors on output, the committee has arbitrarily used a figure of \$3 per KW in excess of 2,800 KW's of peak and the total of \$2,352.76 is arrived at under this new proposal for the four year period using the same KW hour peak as before.

Councillor MacCausland stated that the two proposals have been handed to the town's consultants, Engineering Services, and they are to forward a report giving their considered opinion on the economic differences between the proposed Maritime rates and a new unit.

Councillor MacCausland said the peak load for last month (March) was 2515 KW hours on Friday, March 8th. He said this was an increase of 470 KWH over March 1958.

Councillor Ernest Morrison was welcomed to the council by Mayor Currie as he had been absent from the March meeting due to reasons of health. Councillor Morrison in his report stated that the town employees had started work on the school grounds and had repaired a roof on the caretaker's shack at the dump.

Chairman of the finance committee, Councillor Leo Wood stated that the 1959 assessment roll would carry a tax on cars and not an assessment as in the past.

He asked the co-operation of all councillors in preparing their estimates for the year before the

meeting.

Councillor R. B. Dewar told of the difficulties encountered in water and sewerage facilities during the winter due to the very cold weather and made certain recommendations.

Reporting on the streets, the chairman of this committee said he couldn't remember when streets were in such good repair for this time of year as they are now. Councillor Dewar stated he felt it will be necessary to carry out sidewalk repairs next year and after a meeting of his committee will decide on the street program for this spring and summer.

A notice of motion Councillor Dewar had presented at last month's meeting in regard to churches and church halls being put on the domestic electric light rate was held over for a meeting of the full council. Councillor Wood read a report submitted by Councillor Rogers, chairman of the water and sewerage committee, which related difficulties encountered and made several recommendations in this regard.

Councillor Dewar, in reply to a query from Councillor MacCausland as to what is being done with the gravel owned by the town, congratulated Councillor Wood on his foresight last year in stockpiling gravel, which he said is now being put to good use.

He said there is some left and much of this will be used on the new parking lot. Councillor MacCausland queried Councillor Arsenault as to whether the police are using the speed watch. Councillor Arsenault said he would check on this and report back at the next meeting. Councillor MacCausland stated it wasn't a matter of "catching people" with speed watch, "it's more of a deterrent."

Mayor Currie stated the speed checking device had been put to good use last year with good effect.

RESOLUTIONS
Resolutions passed included:
(1) That the town agree to provide secondary power to operate the traffic light at the intersection of the western road and the RCAF military road.
(2) Provide secondary power to operate the RCAF beacon at Miscouche Point, in each case to be paid for by the Department of National Defence at the prevailing rates for rural electric service.
(3) That the following parking areas be now designated as parking meter areas: Central Street, East Side, from Water Street to Fitzroy (B) Central Street, west side, from the North side of the parking lot now owned by the Clifton Hotel to Second Street, and that parking meters be installed in these areas immediately.
(4) That tenders be invited for the purchase and removing of a one-storey dwelling now situated on land owned by the town and being on the west boundary of the Civic Stadium property.
(5) That Girl Guides be permitted to hold tag days May 29, 30th.
(6) That Kinette Club be permitted to hold peanut days Thursday and Friday, June 11, 12.

TIGNISH — Miss Beatrice McCarthy, member of a prominent Tignish family, passed away Thursday evening in the Western Hospital, Alberton. She was in her 71st year and had been in hospital for eight months.

She was born at Sea Cow Pond where she first attended school later going on to Tignish High School, Notre Dame Academy in Charlottetown and Prince of Wales College where she received her first class teachers license.

After teaching school for several years on the island she went to Saskatchewan where she continued in the teaching profession until 1949 when she retired and returned to her home in Tignish where she resided with her brother, Justin McCarthy.

Surviving is another brother Leslie J. in Tignish, two sisters: Rev. Mother St. Gerald, CND, at the Mother House in Montreal, and Rev. Mother St. Mary Justin, CND, who is Mother Provincial at Ottawa; a niece, Mrs. Ralph Gaudet, (Colen) Alberton, and two nephews, Gerald and Eric McCarthy in Tignish.

She was predeceased by two brothers, Chester P. McCarthy, who practised law in Tignish; inspector in Saskatchewan and a sister, Rev. Sister St. Abercius. Solemn Requiem High Mass

was celebrated Monday morning at 10 o'clock in the Church of St. Simon and St. Jude, Tignish.

Youth Suffers Head Injuries In Accident At Port Hill Stn.

A Tynes Valley youth, Carmen Dawson, 18, may possibly be flown to Victoria General Hospital in Halifax this morning suffering from severe head injuries.

The youth was injured when he was crushed by the door of a railway car at Port Hill Station about 1:30 yesterday afternoon.

The accident occurred when Dawson was jammed by the door which slid towards the closing position when the car was shunted by a railway locomotive.

The injured man, employed with George Ellis, Tynes Valley potato dealer, was reported to have been loading potatoes at the time the accident occurred.

Large Number Of Chickens Lost In New London Blaze

KENSINGTON — A brooder house containing 275 chickens, owned by Allison MacLeod, New London, burned to the ground last evening after flames swept through the building with lightning speed, permitting only a very few of the large number of chickens to be rescued.

The 14 by 18-foot brooder house contained an oil brooder from which the fire is believed to have started. It was first noticed by a neighbor Eric Heaney, but neighbors who gathered to help and who were later joined by the Kensington Fire Department could not save the building or the chickens except for two or three.

The chickens were six weeks old. Although the brooder house was only few yards from the barn the flames were prevented from spreading due to the direction of the wind and the firemen.

It could not be learned if the loss was covered by insurance.
