

Summerside "Literary Institute."

As announced last week this Institute was opened in Messrs. Strong's Hall on the evening of Tuesday last. After a short speech from the President D. Enman, Esq., in which he stated to the audience the intention of the Institute, its salutary tendencies, &c. F. McNeill, Esq., came forward and gave an address, wherein he briefly glanced at some of the most important events which transpired during the passing year, both on our own island and in distant parts of the world; referred to the wholesome influence which institutes similar to the one now being formed, had upon young men who availed themselves of the facilities they afforded for mental development, &c. T. McKinlay, Esq., then came forward and entertained the audience, by reading what he considered as very appropriate for the season, a "Stanza" from Charles Dickens's "Christmas Carol." Thos. Kirwan, Esq., was the next who took the platform, and read in a pleasing and natural manner some excellent selections from the poets; he also read an original poem entitled the "Summerside boys," which was amusing and instructive. It is to be hoped that the Summerside boys will profit by the admonition. After these proceedings were brought to a close, Capt. J. S. Walsh, Mr. John Gaffney and the "vice-president," Mr. J. P. Baker, made a few suitable remarks, and Mr. McDonald being present, he was called upon to make some remarks, to which he cheerfully responded, and stated that it augured well for the prosperity of the Institute to see so respectable an audience present, and there were various means by which instruction could be imparted, and that an Institute of this kind was one of those means; he also expressed the hope that the Institute would continue to prosper. Mr. John Sharpe, at the request of the audience read Burns's "Tam O' Shanter," which he did in the good old style. Judging from the large and respectable audience present, the number of names now on the roll, there is no doubt, but the Institute, with the co-operation of the wealthy portion of our townsmen, will continue to flourish. President Johnson, in his message to Congress said—"The practical regulations concerning the Colonial trade and Fisheries can only be accomplished by a treaty between Great Britain and the United States, until Congress shall have expressed their judgment concerning the principles involved."

The Scl. O'My, of Grand River, P. E. I., Capt. McDonald—a Newfoundland, left Bourgeo, Newfoundland for this island, in the month of October last, and has not since been heard of. There were on board besides the crew, Capt. John Beaton, of Kollo Bay, and two men, belonging to Grand River, both named John Morrison, cousins. The vessel is supposed to have foundered in the gale of the 18th October.—1st.

We understand that the Hon. T. H. Invaland has offered to sell the Government 5000 acres of land on Lot 43, and 1000 acres on Lot 41, at the rate of 6s. currency per acre. These terms seem reasonable, and we hope they will be accepted.—2nd.

Very Latest Telegrams.

London, Dec 13. George Francis Train has been set at liberty, the plaintiff in the case against him having withdrawn the suit. Train has issued writs against the Marquis of Aberdeen, Lord Ligonier, and against the Eberly Yarn Steeple Company for \$20,000. Mr Train will sail in the "Australia" from Queens-town to-morrow, for New York.

Despatches from Madrid show that affairs in Spain are rapidly approaching a crisis. Admiral Topete has been dispatched to Cadiz to negotiate with the insurgents, but by the latest reports he has met with no success. An interview was held there between the leading rebels and the representatives of the Provisional Ministry at which Admiral Topete was present. The rebels demanded a share in the Government, which was refused by Topete, who told them that so long having submitted to a worse Government they must not momentarily obey the present one. The proclamation of the Government declaring the Port of Cadiz under blockade has been promulgated. A fleet consisting of two Ironclad and Transports with 3,000 troops, will sail on the 15th inst. for Cuba.

Madrid, 13th. Gen. Roda yesterday issued the following proclamation to the inhabitants of Cadiz: "A revolution incited and fomented by the secret enemies of the country has already incited with blood the streets of this beautiful city. It has found no echo in any other part of the Peninsula. I have come to suppress this rebellion with the forces placed at my disposal by our Government. Lay down your arms and your lives shall be saved. This I guarantee in the name of the Government, upon whose clemency you may rely. Such are the only means by which insurgents escape being treated with inflexible rigor. I will grant you till to-morrow at noon in order that the old men, women, children, and citizens peaceably disposed may leave the town. Inhabitants of Cadiz, it will not be my fault if by the means of attack which the injurious law of necessity compels me to employ there should come for Cadiz a day of mourning and ruin. I shall regret such a result from the bottom of my heart, but I shall do my duty."

This proclamation produced a marked impression on the insurgents, who sent a delegation accompanied by the United States Consul to Gen. Castellano, and offered to place their arms in the building which he should designate.

Madrid 14th. It is thought that the Republican insurrection at Cadiz will be suppressed to-day without the shedding of blood. All foreigners left the city some days ago, fearing a general civil war.

A very heavy gale prevailed throughout England on Saturday night and Monday morning. Many Telegrams reporting Marine disasters have been received. The Shipping in the harbors has suffered much. Houses were blown down. The damage is very great.

Letters received from Vienna, Pesth, Trieste and other parts Austria by banking Houses in Paris, speaks of a war between that country and Prussia as unavoidable. They represent the armament now going on as having no other object than to vindicate the honour of the Austrian Army cruelly wounded two years ago on the Plains around Nicholasburgh.

New York, Dec. 9. The President's message was delivered to Congress to-day.

The President reiterates his policy of reconstruction, reviews the financial questions in which he advocates economy in Government expenditures and an early resumption of specie payments.

Relations with Foreign Powers are generally satisfactory.

With regard to pending questions with Great Britain, the President says, "Their are the mutual rights of Naturalization, the Boundary question, involving the title to the Island of San Juan on the Pacific coast, and the mutual claims and subjects of the two countries for injuries and deprivations committed under the authority of their respective Govern-

ments. Negotiations upon these subjects are pending, and I am not without hope of being able to, by before the Senate, for its consideration during the present session, protocols calculated to bring to an end those justly exciting and long existing controversies."

London, Dec. 10th—Evening. The new Parliament opened this afternoon by Royal Commission. The usual speech from the Throne was omitted.

The House of Commons re-elected the Right Hon. John Evelyn Denison as Speaker.

The London Times has a long editorial on the Message of President Johnson alluding to the Alabama negotiations. It says: "The English Government show every desire to make an arrangement, and it is difficult to believe that the President's Cabinet or a hostile majority in Congress will throw over a settlement arrived at after a long and laborious negotiations."

The members of the new Ministry had an audience with the Queen yesterday, and formally accepted appointments. The following appointments in the new Government were officially announced:—

Wm. F. Forster, Vice President of the Board of Education; James Stansfield, Jr. Acton C. Ayerton, and Geo. Glenelg Glynne, Junior Lords of the Treasury; M. E. Grant Duff, Under Secretary for India; Hon. Wm. Monsell, Under Secretary for the Colonial Department, Edward H. R. Hugerson, Under Secretary for the Home Department; John Arthur Atway, Under Secretary for the Foreign Department.

Latest telegrams from Spain state that the insurgents in Cadiz have demanded terms of capitulation which it is understood the Government is disposed to grant and meanwhile an armistice of two days has been agreed to with the Insurgents in Cadiz for the burial of the dead and to allow the women and children to leave the city. At its conclusion the combined attack will be made by the troops, and the fleet upon the quarter of the city which is occupied by the Rebels. The latter have set free and armed seven hundred convicts from the prisons and the galleys.

It is estimated that the rebels in Cadiz number 3,000 men.

All the foreign Consuls have taken refuge in the Custom House, and the civil Governor of the city has fled to San Fernando.

Mount Etna, in Sicily, is in a fresh eruption, which broke forth with great violence on Tuesday night. The torrents of lava devastated the surrounding country, and ashes from the crater were blown as far as Messina. The spectacle is visible from the northern shore of Malta, 120 miles distant.

New York, 11. Lewis Saylord Clark, well known Editor and Poet is not expected to survive the injuries he received from a fall at his residence on Wednesday, in New Jersey.
