TRANSVAAL QUESTION TOPIC OF INTEREST

London Papers Take a Pessimistic View.

OF THE REFERENCES MADE IN THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.

Most Important Despatches Received at the Foreign Office.

HURRICANE IN WEST INDIES.

Piercest and Most Destructive in Many Years.

KINGSTON, Ja., Aug. 10.—Reports of the hurricane now sweeping the West India Islands show that great damage to crops has been caused. Buildings have been blown down and many vessels wrecked, and it is feared that the total loss of life will be appalling. The storm is increasing in violence and a rapidly falling barometer produces the wildest storm. Telegraphic communication with some of the islands is interrupted. The hurricane is the fiercest in many years.

THE WORLDS BICYCLE MEET

Attended by Eight Thousand People.

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—Eight thousand people attended the opening day's race of the Worlds Bicycle Meet.

In the series of finals for the half mile championship, Cherry, the English champion, was thrown off his wheel and so seriously injured that he had to be removed to the hospital.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT

Train Wrecked at St. Polycarp Yesterday.

OTTAWA, August 10.—Firman McLure, M. P., for Colchester, was a passenger on the train that was wrecked at St. Polycarp yesterday.

He arrived at Ottawa last evening and gives an interesting account of his experience.

The loss of life, he said, occurred in the second class car, which seemed to climb right up on the engine.

Those in front of the car escaped with some injuries, but the rear end got over the boiler, and escaping steam scalded them to death.

Five were killed, and others injured will die.

THE BRANCH RAILWAY

Senator Ferguson Puts in a Claim for the Others.
