This money has been duly forwarded to the famine-stricken districts to be distributed amongst the more distressed inhabitants.
A curious relic of British mission work exists in Russia. Near the celebrated watering-place, Patigorsk, and within sight of the magnificent range of the Caucasus, lies the little colony of Kurras, an old Mission station of the Free Church of Scotland. At the present time it is chiefly inhabited by Germans, and the church services are held in their language. There are, however, still left a few members of the community, the children of the Mission converts, who can speak English. It is interesting to note that among the community are found persons of Circassian and Tartar blood, whose fathers were the fruit of the old Mission. This colony is entirely independent of all ecclesiastical superiors, and is ruled in accordance with the ordinances of the Free Church of Scotland. The Mission was originally commenced in the reign of Czar Alexander I., and supervised by that of his successor Nicholas.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
The Newfoundland Difficulty DISCUSSED BY THE LORDS
LONDON, March 20.
In the House of Lords yesterday, Lord Knutsford, Secretary of State for the Colony, introduced a bill to revise certain provisions controlling the Newfoundland fisheries rights of foreign powers. He hoped in spite of all difficulties a compromise would be arranged whereby the colony's burdens would be lessened, and believed Newfoundland's protest was founded upon misapprehension. At any rate, England thought that arbitration is the best course. The opposition of the colonists has, he said, considerably embarrassed the government. Lord Kimberley concurred in the remarks of Lord Knutsford. Lord Salisbury supported Lord Knutsford, and said Newfoundland was now paying the penalty of errors made in past treaties. The bill passed the first reading.

RECIPROCITY.

Commissioners to Proceed to Washington.
OTTAWA, March 20.
It is probable that Sir Charles Tupper, Sir John Thompson and Hon. G. E. Foster, will go to Washington in a few days to treat with the United States government in respect to a renewal of reciprocal trade between the United States and Canada.

Another Strike.

NEW YORK, March 20.
A general strike of all the union cloth hat and cap makers in this city (eight hundred in number, employed by seventeen firms) occurred this morning. Hundreds of strikers gathered at the manufactories and took out their sewing machines with the aid of scores of expressmen, and had the machines conveyed to their homes. The strike is the outcome of a difficulty at Lichteinstein and Son's shop, where the men struck some weeks ago. The Manufacturers' Association does not propose to offer any compromise.

The Cariboo Election.

VANCOUVER, March 20.
The election in Cariboo district, for the House of Commons was held to-day. Mr. Bainard, Conservative, is probably elected by a good majority, although all the polling places will not be heard from before Sunday.

Railway Blocked.

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 20.
Last night the Canadian Pacific freight train for Montreal with sugar, left the rails six miles from this city. The train was blocked until seven o'clock this morning and all outward night trains were cancelled in consequence.

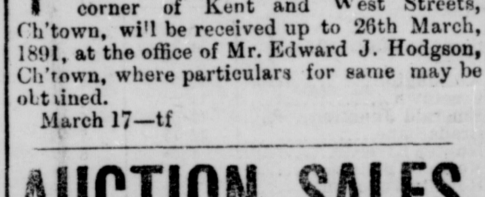
