

Report Red Cross Campaign Makes Progress

Red Cross campaign officials said last night that \$11,713.33 had been received to date, \$7,113.69 of this amount has been subscribed in Charlottetown — \$5,136.00 through the special names committee, \$1,776.65 through the General men's canvass and \$222.04 from the ladies house to house canvass which got underway during the week. These figures are somewhat better than the results at the same time last year.

In the canvass of the City Building Chief MacArthur was ably assisted by Mr. Ralph Crockett. Several of the men listed as canvassers had to be replaced because of sickness. Mr. Leo Doyle, manager of the Fit Rite Shoe Store took over for Mr. Ivan Monaghan, and Mr. Jim Morris did the work assigned to Mr. Maurice Prowse. Special mention should be made of the excellent work done by Mrs. Freda MacKinnon who always looks after the canvassing of the staff at the P. E. I. Hospital. Splendid co-operation and assistance has continued to be received from many members of firms who actually do the Red Cross collecting from fellow-employees although the cards are left with them and are picked up by those listed as canvassers.

The campaign has been in full swing in Summerside this week led by Mr. R. T. Henthorn, it is too early yet to have a report on the results.

To date \$4,599.64 has been received from districts in Prince Georges and Kings Counties in all of which there are still a few in which no canvassers have been secured. Outstanding among the returns received this week was \$300.70 collected in Souris by the Junior Ladies' Aid of the Souris Hospital under the able leadership of Mrs. George Roach, president of this energetic organization.

Eye-Care Essay Contest Announced

The Canadian National Institute for the Blind and the Lions Clubs of P. E. I. announced yesterday that they will jointly sponsor an essay contest for all Grade VII pupils in this Province. The subject for the essay is "Care of Your Eyes" and is to be held during the month of April.

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New Revolutionary Process For Heating Steel Ingots

VANCOUVER, (CP)—A revolutionary process of heating steel ingots by electric induction was put into operation here Friday at the Vancouver rolling mills of Western Canada Steel, Ltd.

C. D. Hobbs, company president, said it was the first time electric induction has been used anywhere for heating ingots for rolling.

He said the process cuts the time for heating ingots by 75 per cent and will result in increased production and lower fuel costs.

Mr. Hobbs said the installation was designed and built in Canada and predicted the process would be adopted wherever electric power is plentiful.

The process heats ingots to 2,300 degrees Fahrenheit in from eight to 12 minutes compared to 45 minutes with oil-fired furnaces. Plant officials said fuel costs will drop \$1 a ton and the plant's capacity will increase to 70,000 tons a year from 40,000.

The process uses a basic law of physics. If a steel ingot, or any other conductor, is placed in an electrified coil, an electric current is induced within the ingot.

Resistance to the current heats the ingot.

The induction unit here comprises a series of large copper coils placed end to end to form a tunnel.

Ingots, fed hot at one end, emerge white hot at the other, ready for rolling.

The tunnels or furnaces are fed by 60,000 volts of electricity and have a total capacity of 10,000 horsepower.

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Labor Layoff Due At Pictou

PICTOU, N. S. (CP)—The shipbuilding firm of Ferguson Industries Ltd., this Northumberland Strait town's principal business, said Friday it expected to lay off more than 20 per cent of its staff in the next two weeks.

Vice-President James B. Ferguson said the company yards had nearly completed a refit of the minesweeper Wallacebank which is expected to sail for Halifax shortly after April 15.

"Work on the new Prince Edward Island ferry has not yet begun as we are awaiting design drawings—and it will be considerable time before construction can begin," Mr. Ferguson said.

The firm employs about 350 at present and this will be reduced to 275. The yards still have several repair contracts.

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Seriously Injured In Accident Last Evening

William Taylor of 80 Bayfield Street, was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital last evening in a critical condition after he was struck by a car at the intersection of Kent and Hillsboro Streets about 8:15. Mr. Taylor is reported to be suffering from a broken leg, as well as severe head and internal injuries.

Mr. Allison Carver, driving a small recent model Nash runabout car, told police that he was proceeding north on Hillsboro St. and was making a left turn onto Kent Street when the accident occurred. He immediately phoned for an ambulance which took the injured man to the hospital.

William Longaphie, who was walking with Taylor at the time, said he saw the car and jumped back in time to clear its path but apparently the injured man failed to notice it and walked into the path of the moving vehicle.

City Police state that Carver did not remain at the scene of the accident until their arrival and as a result will be charged with criminal negligence. Carver, who caught one weighing 20 lb. 8 oz. at Hazelton, B.C.
