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Offer \$1,500 Reward In Bahamas Slaying Case

(By Edna Dupuch, Canadian Press Correspondent) NASSAU, Bahamas, April 20 (CP) — The Bahamas Government today offered a \$500 (\$1,500) reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suffocation slayer of a 38-year-old vacationing woman lawyer from Washington.

Offer \$1,500 Reward In Bahamas Slaying Case

Betty Renner's body was found Wednesday in a three-foot-wide well opening in a lonely, uninhabited forest area off the "black road" near the southern shore of 20-mile long Providence Island.

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Following up on the reward by offering by every section of this town of 21,000 persons — rich and poor, black and white — for a quick solution and quick justice. The entire town has been upset and excited crowds have milled around the death scene as they did seven years ago in the Sir Harry Oakes' murder case.

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The well in which Miss Renner's tall, slim body was found is three miles overland from Westbourne where the bludgeoned and burned body of the fabulously wealthy Canadian gold miner who became a baronet was found July 8, 1943.

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Meanwhile, police said a search was on for a "very type" seen cycling with Miss Renner a short time before she disappeared Tuesday.

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They said Miss Renner, struck heavily on the head, had been dragged across a rough coral surface, her clothing stripped off and her body dumped in the well. Only her brassiere remained. Medical examination disclosed she died of suffocation and no evidence of rape was found.

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Police were offering the theory of a surprise attack. Miss Renner left here alone Tuesday on a sight-seeing tour of the eastern end of Providence Island. Apparently she took the wrong turn and lost her way.

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She apparently stopped her assault to ask directions and she probably offered her as a guide. The attack then occurred but police said how the murderer got Miss Renner off the road is unexplainable.

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Blight-Resistant Potatoes To Go On Sale Next Year

FREDERICTON, April 21 (CP) — Two probably blight-resistant potato varieties, developed at the Fredericton Dominion Experimental Station, are expected to go on sale to private growers next winter, the agricultural committee of the New Brunswick Legislature was told today by L.C. Young, senior horticulturist at the station.

Blight-Resistant Potatoes To Go On Sale Next Year

The Legislature adjourned until Tuesday after approving 21 private bills. Prorogation late next week was considered possible.

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Although cautioning against over-optimism, Mr. Young predicted that the new potato species, as yet known only as F391 and F44, would be important to the potato industry in coastal regions of the Maritime Provinces, where blight is a problem. The two types were developed from 190,000 tested varieties.

Blight-Resistant Potatoes To Go On Sale Next Year

He said he had seen no sign of blight where they had been grown in fields, and they had not been sprayed against the disease. This development had been done in Fredericton but the varieties now were being grown for multiplication purposes in all Provinces, although 75 per cent of the seedlings remained in the Maritimes. The Federal Government had assumed the responsibility for their multiplication and the tubers were being grown under contract.
