INFORMATION WANTED.

Sir,—Would it not be well just at this time, when many are considering whether they should throw in their lot with their neighbors and organize co-operative dairying companies, to hear from the patrons of the cheese factories that were in operation last season.

We would like to know how it paid them to supply their milk to the factory in comparison with manufacturing it at home not long ago.

A few words from the patrons of each factory would do more towards convincing the farmers whether or not it would be to their interests to engage in co-operative dairying than any amount of lectures by professors, who, the most people think, are paid to lecture anyway.

In trying to work up an interest in co-operative dairying last spring, I found it a difficult task on account of farmers knowing so little about the business and having so little faith in it.

What the people want is information from their fellow farmers, who have been engaged in the business.

Come now, patrons, tell us what you know about it. I think THE EXAMINER will give you space for any sound information you want to give us about the matter.

It might interest your readers, especially those interested in horse and their value, to give a few prices obtained for choicebred ones at New York last week.

Among "Andy" Welch's selected stock, said to be sold for good prices, a four-year-old Red Wilkes Belmont colt sold for \$535.

Maney, 2274, a Jay Gould-Ellian Allen stallion, 13 years old, sold for \$500.

Bostonian, a yearling colt, sold for \$100. In J. W. Daly's lot, a three-year-old Alcantara-Almont colt sold for \$485.

two-year-old Allerton-Harold colt sold for \$110, a four-year-old Stamboul-Moor, sold for only \$250. In a combination sale in Kentucky the Alarie Almonte-Graftonian colt Jim Corbett, 2194, sold for \$470.

and the Virginia Boy, four-year-old colt Ashby, 223, sold for \$500. The mares and fillies sold at a little better prices.

Zemba, 2151, six years old, sold for \$5,000, only five of the different lots running into four figures; an Election-General Benton mare, six years old, for \$220.

Of three Ormond fillies, \$140 was the highest price obtained. Can this be the same Ormond that is such a much higher priced mare? If so, it does not seem to be profitable work breeding to him.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. BRITISH PARLIAMENT MEETS. The Liberal-Unionists Are in Caucus.

LONDON, Feb. 13. The House of Commons met yesterday. In reply to a question, Sir Edward Gray, Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, said that a British vessel at Rio Janeiro enjoyed the same facilities as were had by vessels of other nations.

The Duke of Devonshire, Leader of the Liberal Unionists, has called a meeting of his Parliamentary party for Thursday. The meeting will be asked to decide whether the party shall support Lord Salisbury against the Commons.

Steam Navigation Co.'s Request. They Want \$10,000 a Year. OTTAWA, Feb. 13. Directors of the P. E. Island Steam Navigation Company, who are still here in connection with the renewal of their contract for carrying mails across the Northumberland Straits, are asking that the amount of the subsidy be restored to the original sum, namely, \$10,000.

Storm in Great Britain. Two Girls Killed—A Car Upsets. LONDON, Feb. 13. In West Cork the gale caused immense damage to property. Two girls in bed asleep at Wolverhampton, Staffordshire, were instantly killed by a chimney falling upon them through the roof.

Disaster at Liverpool. LONDON, Feb. 13. The ship New City, at Liverpool from St. John, N. B., was strained by colliding with the pier head during yesterday's gale. Her starboard channel plates were smashed.
