**THE PARTY VS. TEMPERANCE.**

"A SON OF TEMPERANCE" writes to the editor of The Guardian and directs his attention to increase of drunkenness in town and country resulting from the Farquharson License law and the remarkable laxity of the prosecution of the Scott Act. He says:

"Let it not be forgotten that for the month of July, 1898 under Free Ram (so-called, there were only thirteen arrests for drunkenness, and under the Farquharson License Act there were thirty-seven in July, 1899. So much for the first month under license. Now look at the record for the month of November, just ended, after six months trial of the Farquharson Act. For the month of November, 1898, there were 26 arrests for drunkenness, and for the month of November, 1899, there were 36, an increase of nearly one half. And do not forget the fact that in November, 1898, John P. Nicholson had hundreds of men working in the sewers, and in November, 1899, there is not one. Worse than this, in November, 1898, there were two arrests for assault, while in November, 1899, there were 10. This is bad enough in all conscience, but it is only an index of the total demoralization all over the Province, brought about by the duplicity of Mr. Farquharson.

"On Monday night an indignation meeting will be held in Kensington to protest against the conduct of the Prosecutor. At Montague the citizens have for now a vigilance committee to protect themselves. "In every part of the Province new dens are opening up and yet we hear nothing of the prosecutions except a reply from one of the most garrulous that 'it is no use to convict them—we can collect nothing from them."

In view of these facts, to which its attention has been sufficiently drawn, it is wonderful that The Guardian does not—following the example of Mr. Marshall—call upon the electors of Belfast and Murray Harbor to "vote them down." The Guardian's apathy cannot be accounted for upon any other hypothesis than that it is more strongly attached to the Liberal Party than it is to temperance.

**BOERS KILLED BY BOERS**

Dressed in Khaki They were Mistaken for British.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, cabling under date of November 27, from Naauwpoort, says that a Dutchman living near the scene of the skirmish of November 23 declares that a party of Boers, dressed in khaki, while approaching their own position, were fired on by their comrades, who mistook them for British soldiers. Five or six of them were killed.
