### REVIVAL IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

A Large Mining Boom Is Under Way and Good Times Are Looked For. During the past several months, says the Victoria Colonist, there has been a noted increase in business throughout the Province, and generally a more cheerful feeling amongst all classes of business men. The improvement in trade is more apparent in wholesale provisions and dry goods, and in the retail of these lines, but commercial people as a whole look forward with greater cheerfulness than for the past several years, for the outlook is most encouraging. The belief is general that the iron and forest industries are now going on, and an improved lumber market are sure to bring in good results. The working of the gold and silver mines of Kootenay and of the gold mines of Cariboo, has had much to do with the increase of trade, and as their development will proceed with a much larger scale from this forward, it is but reasonable to conclude that general business will be proportionately benefited. The recent improvement in the circulation of money was of course induced to a considerable extent by the large payments made on account of the salmon, sealing and fur industries, which have this year, through various channels to the benefit of all. The belief is in the air, however, that times are on the mend, and this has much to do with the better state of affairs. Logarithmic prophecies of direful things to happen have ceased, and the prophets on the business outlook are dealing out most pleasing forecasts. It is impossible to say anything on this head without first and foremost mentioning the mining movement. The mines of British Columbia this year will produce from five to eight hundred per cent. more than during any year in the past five. The prospect is bright for the year this will be repeated, and double the amount taken from the placer and quartz mines than will have been secured when 1895 closes. There is good reason, then, for the statements of the business prophets for all lines of trade will be benefited by the mining boom. However, the coal, fish, and timber industries are being added to, and farming, dairying and fruit raising are being entered into by greater numbers. While the resources of sea, mine and forest are being added to, and the workers are thereby being produced in our midst, and the provinces enriched to the extent of keeping the money paid for the same at home.

### MARK TWAIN AT SYDNEY.

His Impressions of Australia Upon Arriving Off Shore at Sydney. "Do not forget my soulful eyes. Under the circumstances I shall be unable to twist a diamond of superb brilliancy on my forefinger as I talk to you, but do not forget my soulful eyes and deeply intellectual expression." Thus spoke Mark Twain as he leaned over the side of the steamer "Warrieroo" after his cast anchor in Watson's bay at midnight, and heaved slowly and sluggishly in the waters of Sydney Harbor. These were the opening words of an interview carried on with him from the deck of a little launch that bobbed about below the walk-like side of the big steamer. "I am going to write a book on Australia," he added between the snorts of steam from the escape pipe. "And I think I ought to start now. You always know so much more of a country than you have seen it than when you have. Besides, one does not get his mind strengthened by hard facts. The hardest facts for people who visit foreign places so as to write books are local facts. They come out and startle you with information you do not want, and then asperse your memory ever afterward.
