Local and Other Items.

Good skating on Government Pond.

SIR JOHN MACDONALD is so ill that his medical attendants deem it unwise to allow even his colleagues in the Cabinet to consult him.

AN Indian appeared at Court this forenoon for drunkenness. He refused to tell where he got the liquor, and was remanded to jail until he gave the necessary information.

ALL members of the Charlottetown Philharmonic Society are requested to meet in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, this evening at eight o'clock sharp for practice. Persons wishing to join the Society should attend this meeting.

THE imports of goods at Montreal in the month of October were \$2,687,498 against \$2,531,823 in the corresponding month of 1879. Dutiable goods show an increase, and free goods a falling off, of nearly 100 per cent. The increase of imports for the ten months of 1880 are nearly \$6,000,000 over those of last year.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Edward Gahen, arrested for assault, was remanded to jail for examination. Joseph Valley, for breaking windows in Rollo Fire Engine House, was fined \$5. Owen McCarey and James Founnessy, arrested for disorderly conduct on the streets, were sentenced to four and two months' imprisonment, with hard labor, respectively.

"A THIEF IN THE NIGHT."—One of our city private watchmen was on Saturday night, robbed of a handsome amount of money in gold—seven and a half sovereigns. It appears that he, during the night, retired for a nap with the watchman of another section. When he awoke, he discovered to his surprise that the gold was gone. The unfortunate watchman has a very strong suspicion of the thief, and the matter will probably come before the Court in a few days.

THE foundations are being laid for a beet-root sugar factory at West Farnham, Exeter Township, Quebec. The building is to cost \$30,000. The Hochelaga cotton mills, Montreal, have put in an engine capable of running 400 more looms, and a number of the new looms are soon to be put up. Gault Bros., Montreal, intend to erect a woolen and cotton mill at Campbellford, near Belleville. There is good water power there, and the people have voted a bonus of \$10,000 towards the undertaking.

RAILWAY MEETING.—Enthusiastic public meetings have lately been held at Bay Verte and Cape Tormentine in the interest of the Cape Tormentine Railway, and we are glad that the people of Amherst are also to hold a meeting, as announced in our advertising columns. The meeting will be attended by a number of gentlemen from various portions of the proposed line; and we trust that the people of Amherst and vicinity will recognize the great importance of manifesting their interest in the project by a general attendance.—Amherst Gazette.

JOHN RICHARDS, Esq., M. W. Grand Master in company with a number of brethren from the city, visited Colville Lodge, at Souris on Saturday last. A most enjoyable meeting took place, spirited and earnest speeches being the prominent feature. Yesterday morning the company attended the Presbyterian Church, and listened to an eloquent discourse by Rev. J. G. Cameron. In the evening they attended the Methodist Church at which place the service was conducted by Rev. Thomas Stebbins. This morning the party returned to the city, well pleased with the visit. The Grand Master will officially visit St. Lawrence Lodge this evening, and attend the meeting of the encampment to-morrow (Tuesday) night.

THE STORM.—The storm drum was ordered up between 7 and 8 o'clock on Saturday evening last. Soon after, the wind freshened from the south-east, and blew heavily from that direction until about 6.30 on Sunday morning, when it veered to the west. During Sunday the weather was fair, but a gusty gale prevailed during all day from nearly the same direction, and still continues. The greatest velocity recorded by anemometer was 30 miles an hour, but the gusts of wind were much in excess of that amount. The barometer (reduced to sea level) stood on Saturday morning at 30.424; at 8 o'clock on Sunday morning at 29.284, when it began to rise. The maximum temperature during the storm was 45° on Sunday morning; the minimum this morning was 14°.

The steamer Princess of Wales did not leave Summerside on Saturday night, nor did the St. Lawrence leave this port to-day. The brig Hettie Eilen ran ashore in Summerside Harbor yesterday. There is also a vessel ashore at Crapaud. Numberless trees are uprooted and blown across roads in all sections.
