THE BRIDGE

It is understood that the Government Engineer will arrive here tomorrow evening and will be prepared to give information concerning the plan and specification of the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough as well as hear the opinions of the people concerning its location.

There two points to be borne in mind: (1) We want the bridge as soon as it can be constructed; (2) we want it where it will be most convenient for the traffic between Charlottetown and the country south of the Hillsborough, viz—not further east than the line of Cumberland Street.

The whole matter is now in the hands of the Dominion authorities. This may act in accord with public opinion; this may act contrary to public opinion. The responsibility, in any case, lies with them. But we hope and trust that they will place the bridge where it will be out of the way of the local traffic for which the province is to pay the Dominion Government \$12,000 a year for all time to come.

A FALSE IMPLICATION.

Mr. BELL, M. P., is reported as having said in Parliament, referring to the Conservative re-distribution of 1892:—

"They created two Grit hives, one West Prince and the other West Queen's, and made what they considered three fairly strong conservative constituencies. My own constituency will furnish an illustration of what I mean. The constituency of West Prince was made up of fifteen townships, numbering from one to fifteen, as it should be, but in reality from one to fourteen, and then skipped 15 and took 16. They did not take township 15 into West Prince, where it naturally belonged because that township had always given a strong Conservative majority of 100 or 200, and for that reason it was added to East Prince in order to make East Prince a conservative constituency."

All strangers to P. E. Island, listening to or reading these statements of Mr. Bell would imagine that there was a break between Louis 14 and 16. But everyone here knows that Mr. Bell's implication is quite untrue. We are surprised that a goody gentleman such as Mr. Bell, would try to mislead Parliament and the country about such a matter. While it is true that Lot 15 lying along the coast extends across the line of West Prince it is true also that it extends naturally and geographically

into East Prince. Mr. Bell's contention that the taking of the whole of it into East Prince made it a Tory constituency, is ridiculous in view of the fact that East Prince sent Mr. Bell to Parliament.

DISGRACEFUL.

It is simply disgraceful to this country that no flag is flying over the Court House in this city. If the Farquharson Government cannot afford a staff and flag for the building, we have no doubt that the citizens would subscribe the necessary funds. Let a staff be placed over the Court House at once and let the Union Jack float there.

A CRITICISM.

Sir,—The Patriot's report of the speeches given at the formal opening of the Prince of Wales College makes Premier Farquharson say that Dr. Anderson became principal in 1862. This is not correct. Dr. Anderson became principal after the resignation of Dr. Inglis, which was subsequent to 1868.

The cost of education, said the Premier, "is still increasing, yet neither people nor government had cried halt." True, the "people" neither called "halt," nor have they made "complaint." But what of the Grit Government? It did make "complaint," and it "cried halt." What of the \$150 supplement and the \$40 bonus which the Grit Government has taken off the teachers' salaries? But this is one of Farquharson's ways of encouraging education!

Another gentleman stated that the P. W. C. is "abreast of the times in the teaching of classics, mathematics and science." In respect to the first two I shall say nothing. But "science," forsooth! Only the merest rudiments of inorganic chemistry and physics are taught in that institution.

Another gentleman—the acting Attorney General—the man with a portfolio,—without a seat in the Legislature, referred particularly to the Normal school and the capital work of that department. Let me say that while student teachers are taught how to acquire knowledge, they are not taught how to impart that knowledge. Provision is made by our school laws for a training school, but no one has thought fit to supply the "provision." There is no duly qualified instructor in pedagogy. By all means let this latter be provided before we take up the additional studies of German and philosophy, political economy and metaphysics.

DISMISSAL OF MR. BRACE.

Sir,—I notice in the last issue of THE EXAMINER that Mr. E. K. Brace has been dismissed from the position of Gas Inspector for the City of Charlottetown and that the office has been taken over for the present by Mr. Davy, Inspector of Weights and Measures. No doubt this is a scheme concocted until the next election when the office will be again created and given to a person unfit for the position who has been clamoring for the office for some time past.

It appears there was no charge against Mr. Brace, but that he was a Conservative. All intelligent Liberals will regret this course by the Government as Mr. Brace was a careful and efficient official, and has for a number of years been rather independent and took no part in party politics. The Liberal Government at the present time seem to be losing ground by turning out of office men who are not interfering in party politics and leaving those in office who are officious partisans. It seems the party holding the reins of Government are the party of stupidity. No doubt they have not forgotten the result of the two late bye-elections in Bel fast and Murray Harbor. No doubt the result was occasioned to a large extent by the dismissal of the Rev. Mr. McNeill from the office of secretary of Education, he being a resident of that section and not an officious partisan. Owing to the age of Mr. Brace's predecessor, it became necessary to fill the position by a younger man; and now for no reason, no charge being preferred against him, he has been summarily dismissed. Mr. Brace has many friends in the liberal ranks who greatly resent this small action of the Government.

And all the while he was anxious to get on the platform and say something, although his name did not figure on the programme for an address. But Mr. Peters is not the only one who was disappointed. Can it be possible that Premier Farquharson did this in order that he might arrogate to himself the credit of the new college? The man who would act in this way would not hesitate to play philippic with his political opponents.
