

MONDAY

George Hunter, 87, of Indian River died in Prince County Hospital about 8 a. m. yesterday morning from extensive burns received in a fire that completely destroyed his home about 4 p. m. the previous afternoon.

The origin of the fire is uncertain but the elderly man, who lived alone, is known to have been overcome by smoke and flames when he tried to recover clothing and money from the blazing two-storey frame house.

It is expected that in a few days the public building at Montague will be entirely closed in with the end brick work fast nearing completion. The east side and south side are being faced with limestone slabs which present a very attractive appearance, and which will lend immeasurably to the attractiveness of the town. This work is also almost completed and will be finished in a matter of a few days. At the same time other workmen are engaged putting up the tile partitions between the respective departments and rooms.

His Honor, Lieut.-Governor T. W. L. Brown, prorogued the Provincial Legislature at noon Saturday after having given Royal Assent to fifty-four bills.

His Honor was accompanied by his aides, Captain J. J. Connolly, V.R.D., Lieutenant-Colonel A. W. Rogers, E.D.; and Wing Commander A. G. MacMillan.

Plans are underway at present for the inauguration of Maritime Central Airways new service from Goose Bay, Labrador to Gander and St. John's in Newfoundland. It is expected that arrangements for ticketing, traffic procedures, cargo facilities, etc., will be completed by the middle of April. The inaugural date has been set for April 21st.

The new DC 3 service, which will connect with MCA's scheduled flights between Moncton and Goose Bay, will provide an important economic link between the Labrador Peninsula and Newfoundland.

Mr. Edmond Mutch of North River, one of the well known Jersey breeders of the Maritime Provinces, leaves this morning accompanied by his son-in-law, Mr. Fred Kitson of Hampshire, to deliver another one of his young Jersey bulls to the farm of Harold and Robert Masee, Nashau, Iowa. The animal will be shipped by transfer.

Mr. Beaton was among several who noted the plight of the young boys who were being swept sea-ward, and quickly launched a row boat that was nearby he managed to reach the boys and get both of them safely into the boat before returning to shore.
