ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING.—A man named Hogan, belonging to Morell, was brought into the city hospital on Saturday with a bullet in his knee. He had been shooting, and was drawing the charges from his revolver, when one of the charges accidentally went off. The bullet entered a little above the knee and is probably lodged in the joint. The surgeons, after careful probing, have not been able to find it. The effects of the wound will in all probability be serious.

FOUND DEAD.—Coroner Somers held an inquest at the morgue yesterday on the body of Angus McNeil, which was found lying lifeless at the foot of a bank near the Richmond freight sheds, by the men going to work there early in the m.ing. He accompanied the Hudson's Bay expedition as assistant in fitting up the stations, from which trip he had just returned. He was unfortunately addicted to drink, and during a spree last fall, lost a valuable gold watch. He had been so continually drunk since his return from the expedition, that his balance of wages about \$60 was not paid to him, and in his pockets were only found some 12 cents a pipe and tobacco, snuffboxes and a few paper memoranda. The position in which he was found, showed that he had fallen over the bank, probably drunk in the darkness, and been smothered by striking his head on stones, some serious scalp wounds having been sustained, then smothered by lying on his face. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.—Halifax Chronicle.

A two-year-old child was killed at Fergus a few days ago by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of her brother.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Two Battles Fought.

LONDON, Oct. 18. A despatch from Tien Tsin, to the Times says that in an interview, the Viceroy asserted that two battles were fought at Langking, one resulting in the defeat of the Chinese, and the other in the defeat of the French. The losses of the French were considerable, and those of the Chinese heavy.

The Navy and Admiralty.

LONDON, Oct. 19. On the opening of Parliament, a commission will be appointed to enquire into the state of the Navy, and the Admiralty will ask for an increased grant for shipbuilding, to enable it to give orders to private firms for the construction of swift, heavy-armed light-armored vessels.

Louis Riél shot.

TORONTO, Oct. 18. It is reported that Louis Riél was shot in Prince Albert, during a riot there, some days ago. The Government wires are interrupted.

Reinforcements.

PARIS, Oct. 18. Three thousand reinforcements with stores will leave Toulon for Tonquin within a fortnight.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18. It is understood quarantine regulations respecting cholera will be suspended immediately.

Watching for Dynamiters.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18. Detectives have received instructions to watch closely at the hotels for suspect dynamiters.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19. The shore end of the Bennett-McKay cable was successfully laid at Manhattan.

BERLIN, Oct. 18. William, Duke of Brunswick, died this morning.

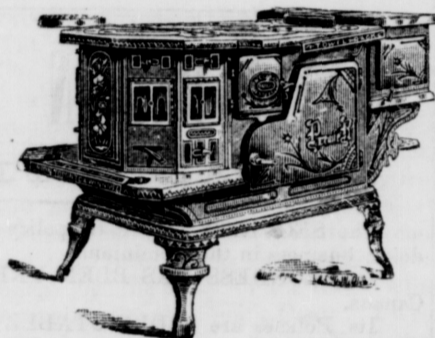

In English:—Orthography, Writing from Dictation, Parsing and Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography.

The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years.
