

Baptist Retreat Set For Dalvay

The eighth annual Baptist Men's Retreat will be held this weekend, September 9, 10 and 11 at Dalvay House on the province's north shore. The theme of this year's retreat is "Our Christian Vocation" and the chairman for the meetings will be Doug Armstrong of Middleton, Nova Scotia.

The theme speaker will be Rev. Harold L. Mitton, DD, minister of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church in Fredericton, N.B. and former minister of the First Baptist Church in Charlottetown. Rev. Maurice Boillat, co-director and administrator of Mission La Bonne Nouvelle, will be the devotional speaker.

Also participating in the conference will be Rev. Lew Farrel, who will be the pianist; Fred Lloyd, who will be the song leader; John Bears, soloist; Ralph Simmons, soloist from Boston, Mass. and the New Glasgow Quartette.

The conference will get underway on Friday evening with advance registration followed by

a hymn sing, evening meditations by Dr. Mitton, and informal witness, prayer and fellowship groups.

SONG SERVICE

On Saturday, activities will get underway at 9:30 a.m. with a welcome from the chairman, Doug Armstrong; this will be followed by a song service led by Fred Lloyd and the devotional with Rev. Boillat.

At 10:15 Dr. Mitton will deliver the first of his theme addresses "Called To Be Saints". At 11:00 a.m. there will be a panel group discussion on Dr. Mitton's address.

After a noon luncheon activities will open with a song service followed by devotions and then the second of Mr. Mitton's addresses will be heard—this one entitled "Chosen to be Priests" and this will be followed with a group panel discussion. The remainder of the afternoon will be devoted to recreation.

A song service will open the evening session and this will be followed by Dr. Mitton's third and final address "Challenged To Be Revolutionaries". This address will also be discussed by the groups.

Later in the evening there will be an informal hymn sing and this will be followed by evening meditation led by Lew Farrel.

Activities on Saturday morning get underway at 7:30 p.m. with a Sunrise Service on the lawn conducted by Rev. Ross Howard. After breakfast devotions will be led by Rev. Boillat and at 10:30 a.m. there will be a communion service led by Rev. Boillat and representative Deacons. The retreat will come to a close after the noon meal.

Additional Crossings Scheduled

Starting today, ferries operating between Cape Tormentine, N.B. and Borden, P.E.I., will provide two additional scheduled crossings daily.

The announcement was made by E.J. Healy, operations manager for Canadian National's Maritime area.

The extra sailings are required to handle a backlog of traffic resulting from the recent railway strike, and will be continued until further notice.

In addition, the sailings will provide an earlier departure time from Borden for Islanders travelling to the mainland, and will allow visitors to reach the province earlier than the present fall schedule, introduced on September 6.

The first additional crossing will be from Cape Tormentine at 6 a.m., and the second will be

from Borden at 7 a.m. Other crossings from both points are at 8 a.m., 9:25 a.m., 11 a.m., 12:25 p.m., 1:50 p.m., 3:15 p.m., and 9:30 p.m.

The P.E.I. membership of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council being held in the Charlottetown Hotel today, will have as their speakers A.D. Margison, president of the A.D. 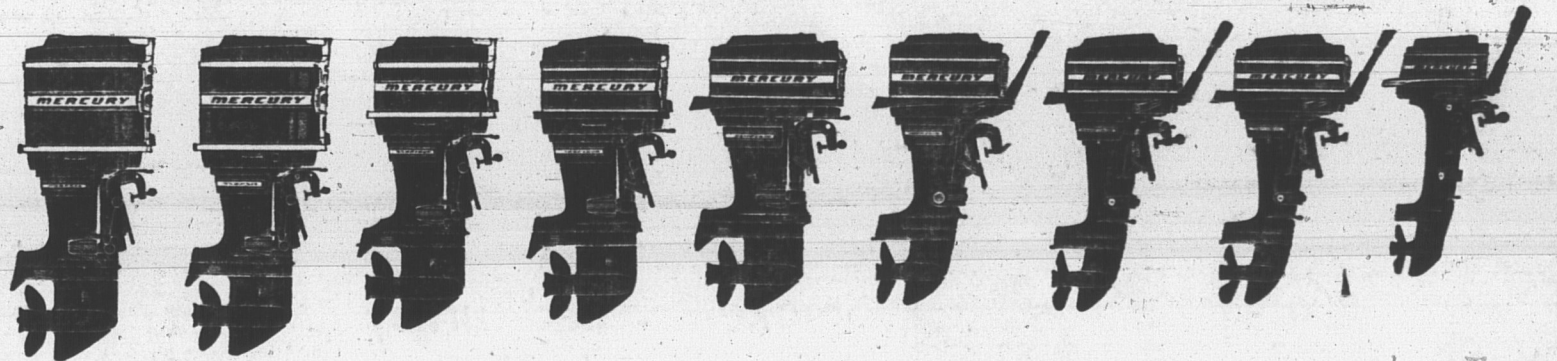
