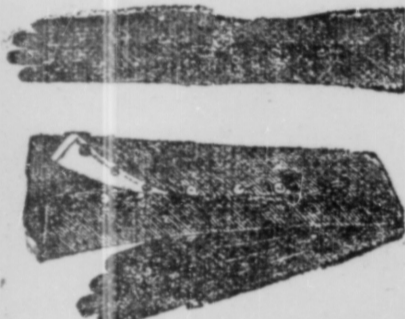

**LOVE FEAST.**—The annual love feast will be held in Grace Church, on Friday next (Good Friday) at 7.30 p. m., when the Rev. George Dawson, M. A., of Cornwall, will deliver the address. Come and enjoy an hour of christian fellowship. All are welcome.

**ISLAND PRIZE WINNER.**—Mr. C. B. Chappell, of Charlottetown, has been awarded the second prize of \$50 in the New York Journal of Architecture's competition. The competition was for plans for a dwelling house and was open to the world. There were a great many plans submitted, and the award was made by prominent architects and builders of New York city. Mr. Chappell is to be congratulated upon his success.

**GRACE CHURCH.**—Grace Church Sunday School will hold an open session of unusual interest tomorrow afternoon. There is a programme consisting of some choice music by a choir of scholars from the school, and other special pieces by individuals, two or three short crisp addresses, and blackboard work. The whole will be well worth your attendance for an hour tomorrow. Exercises begin at 2.30 sharp. The school intends making special offering to the quarterly board of the church, and invite their friends to assist them to make it a success. All who have no where else to go will be made heartily welcome.

**SATELLITE DISCOVERED.** A new satellite of the planet Saturn has been discovered by Professor Wm. H. Pickering at Harvard observatory. It is three and half times as distant from Saturn as Iapetus, the outermost satellite hitherto known. The period is about seventeen months and the magnitude fifteen and a half. The satellite appears on four plates taken at the Arequipa station with the Bruce photographic telescope. The last discovery among the satellites of Saturn was made half a century ago in September, 1848, by Prof. George P. Bond, at the time director of the Harvard College observatory.

**WINDSOR HOTEL FIRE.**—The almost incredible report comes from New York that the fire in the Windsor Hotel was due to incendiarism, and that robbery was the object. It is positively stated that men were seen pillaging rooms as soon as the fire started, and one lady declares that she attempted to escape a man seized her hand and tried to pull some rings from her fingers. Other specific instances of robbery are given. In the lack of any other explanation of the origin of the fire many persons in New York give credence to the incendiary theory, but it does not seem possible that human depravity could go so far as to endanger such a large number of lives for the comparatively small monetary benefit to be gained by robbery.
