

Alouettes Nip Argos 14-12

Ticats Shut Out Riders

Ivan Livingstone, an offensive wingback, teamed up with rifleman Sam Etcheberry on a spectacular 67-yard, last-minute play Saturday that led to a 14-12 win for Montreal Alouettes over Toronto Argonauts.

The win made certain of Alouettes' second-place finish in the windup of the Big Four schedule and gave them the home-field advantage for the sudden-death semi-final playoff next Wednesday against Ottawa Rough Riders. The game is scheduled for 2 p.m. AST.

But with the victory the Als were dealt a disheartening blow. All-star end Hal Patterson, who missed six games earlier this season because of a knee injury, injured the knee again and is out for the season.

Hamilton Tiger-Cats played it easy for 30 minutes Saturday and then rolled for three second-half touchdowns to defeat Ottawa Rough Riders 23-0 at Hamilton in their windup tilt.

END FOUR-YEAR REIGN
At Kitchener, Sarnia Golden Bears ended the four-year reign of Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen as Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union champions Saturday with a lopsided 48-20 triumph in the second game of the best-of-three final. Bears won the opener 29-19 at Sarnia last Wednesday.

The Bears, undisputed leaders of the league throughout the season, sewed up the game with a three-touchdown first quarter,

two of them coming in the opening four minutes.

Livingstone became the hero of the day at Montreal for the same fans who often have booed him and called him "butterfingers" for dropping key passes. When the game ended they swarmed on the field and carried him off.

The lanky Montreal boy didn't score either of Montreal's two touchdowns in the explosive outburst that wiped out a 12-0 deficit in the last three minutes of play. But his electrifying catch of Etcheberry's tremendous pass—a loss that sent the ball about 75 yards—put play on the Toronto three. Joel Wells scored two plays later.

The first Montreal touchdown, at exactly the 12-minute mark of the last quarter, came on a short pass by Etcheberry to Red O'Quinn from 10 yards out.

That put the Als within striking distance. The Argos had set up their 12-0 lead on two singles by Dave Mann—both rouges—a field goal by Vic Kristopaitis and a converted touchdown on a pass by Ronnie Knox to Menan Schriever from eight yards out.

Although already out of the playoff picture, Argos came up with a spirited game in contrast to the 44-7 lacing they took at the hands of the Als in Toronto a week earlier.

At Hamilton, Riders held the mauling Ticats to two first-half singles but quarterbacks Bernie Faloney and Tony Curcillo got them moving in the final 30 min-

utes. Milt Campbell, Gerry McDougall and Don Sutherland counted the touchdown. Harry Lampman took a pass from Faloney for one convert. Steve Oneschuk kicked another. Cam Fraser booted two singles and Faloney was credited with a single when he fumbled after crossing the Ottawa line.

CAMPBELL SCORES
Ticats scored in the third quarter when Campbell dove over for his touchdown from the three-yard line. The six-pointer was set up when McDougall galloped 16 yards on a third-down gamble with Ticats needing three yards to move the sticks.

In the final 15 minutes, Ticats moved from their own 25 to a touchdown by McDougall in six plays.

An intercepted pass by Ron Howell at the Hamilton 37 set up Tiger-Cats' final touchdown in six plays with Sutherland smashing the final 13 yards into payoff territory.

HALIFAX (CP) — Montreal Notre Dame de Grace swept Halifax St. Mary's aside for the third straight season here Saturday, defeating the Maritime champions 58-13 in the Eastern Canada junior football semi-finals.

Pressed only in the fourth quarter, Montreal led 25-0 at half time and had a 38-0 edge before the outtrused Halifax squad struck for its first score.

Montreal qualified to meet the Ontario Rugby Football Union junior champion in the Eastern Canada final.

Halback Jerry Langlois charged through an ineffective St. Mary's line for three Montreal touchdowns on 22, 28 and 43 yard reverses.

SCORE NINE TOUCHDOWNS
End John Shaffer caught passes from Dick Pendergast and Bob

Anderson for two touchdowns. Anderson, Pendergast and halbacks Pete McBride and Vern Griffiths sliced over for other majors. Stu Williams converted four of the nine touchdowns.

St. Mary's moved into the Montreal half of the field only once during the first half and picked up only one first down in the first two quarters.

After backpedalling the early part of the third quarter, St. Mary's drew inspiration from successive nine-yard jaunts by

quarterback Pete Young and half-back Greg McClare.

Young hit Don Burke with a 20-yard toss for St. Mary's first score in three years of playoff competition against Montreal.

Notre Dame penalties helped put St. Mary's in scoring position

on the NDG 18 midway through the final period but Young's pass receivers were blanketed. A fake field goal caught the Montrealers, however, and Bob DelVallet skirted the end for St. Mary's second touchdown.

Montreal picked up 22 first

downs against the St. Mary's. They committed nine forward pass attempts. St. Mary's connected on five. Notre Dame charged 180 yards for 461 yards while St. Mary's could advance only 149 on the ground.

Edmonton Eskies Top Roughriders

REGINA (CP) — Edmonton Eskimos, showing spurts of spectacular play reminiscent of their Grey Cup championship years, trampled Saskatchewan Roughriders 27-11 Saturday afternoon in the opening game of the Western Interprovincial Football Union playoffs.

Directed by Jackie Parker and led by fullbacks Normie Kwong and Johnny Bright, they rolled up a 16-point margin to carry into the second game of the two-game total-points semi-final and became overwhelming favorites to advance to the league final against Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

Second game is scheduled in Edmonton at 2 p.m. MST (5 p.m. AST) Tuesday. The final opens next Saturday at 5 p.m. AST at the home of the Eskimo-Rider winner.

If Riders hope to overcome the wide point deficit, they first must stop Kwong, Bright and Parker, whose combined efforts paced

Eskimos to a total offensive gain of 537 yards.

PARKER SENSATIONAL
Parker, the Tennessee Terror from Mississippi State, ran for one touchdown, passed to end Joe Mobra in sensational fashion for another and kicked three converts. Kwong and halfback Don Flynn scored the other Edmonton touchdowns.

Bobby Marlow scored the Rider touchdown while Jack Hill got a field goal and a convert and quarterback Frank Tripucka kicked a single.

A crowd of fewer than 12,000 turned out in cloudy 38-degree weather. Eskimos fumbled the opening kickoff and Riders took a 3-0 lead after four minutes.

But the enthusiasm soon was chilled as Eskimos marched 101 yards to a touchdown for a 6-3 first-quarter lead and increased the margin to 13-3 by half time. Tripucka's single was the only point of the third quarter, but Eskimos rolled to two touchdowns and Riders to one in the fourth.

Will Compete In Golf Tourney

NEW YORK (AP)—Al Baiding of Toronto and Henry Martell of Edmonton will represent Canada in the sixth International Golf Championship and Canada Cup matches in Mexico City Nov. 20-25.

The 64-man field for the competition, announced Saturday by Frank Pace Jr. of the International Golf Association, is made up of two pros from each of the 32 golfing nations.

Five former champions, including U. S. aces Ben Hogan and Sam Snead and defending titlists Torakichi (Pete) Nakamura and Koichi Ono of Japan, will compete.

The tournament involves 72 holes of medal play, one 18-hole round daily. The country whose two players have the lowest aggregate score wins the Canada Cup. The International Trophy goes to the individual with the lowest total.

BACK TOGETHER
Hogan and Snead, who swept team and individual honors at Wentworth, England, in 1956, will be reunited for the U. S. after a year's lapse. Last year, Hogan was suffering from a back ailment and Jimmy Demaret paired with Snead in Tokyo.

They finished second, nine strokes behind Nakamura and Ono in the team competition.

Snead trailed Nakamura, the individual champion, by seven strokes when the 132-pound Japanese pro shot a record 274 total at the Kasumigaseki Country Club.

The other former champion in the 1958 lineup is Kel Nagle of Australia, who paired with Peter Thomson to win the team title in 1954. He will pair this year with Frank Phillips.

So far, the U. S. is the only country to win more than twice in both team and individual divisions. Ed Furgol won the International Trophy in 1955 and paired with Chick Harbert for the team prize. In '56, Hogan won the individual honors in addition to taking the team aggregate with Snead.

PREVIOUS WINNERS
Argentina in 1953 and Australia in 1954 won the cup in the first two years of the competition. Antonio Cerda of Argentina was the individual winner in 1953 and Canada's Stan Leonard in 1954.

Virtually the entire British Ryder Cup team is entered, playing as separate units for England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales. Another strong team is South Africa's, which pairs Gary Player and Harold Henning. The host Mexican team includes Jose Gonzalez and Juan Neri, both familiar with the course, Mexico City's Club de Golf.

St. F.X. To Meet Wanderers For Maritime Title

ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP)—St. Francis Xavier University and Saint John, N.B., Wanderers will meet here Tuesday for the Maritime football championship and the right to advance into the Canadian Rugby Union intermediate playoffs.

The powerful university squad, winners of the Nova Scotia Football League, haven't lost a game this year. The high-scoring Wanderers, who placed third in the New Brunswick Football League, won four and lost two during regular season play.

University of New Brunswick, with a 16-0 win over Mount Allison University Saturday, won the right to advance into the Maritime round, but elected to stay out. Mount Allison officials decided likewise. That left it open to Saint John.

Tuesday's winner will meet

Lakeshore Flyers next Saturday in Montreal.

Defending intermediate champions, Shearwater Flyers of the NSFL, were eliminated by the St. Francis Xavier team.

Boros Capture Atlanta Open

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Julius Boros fought gusty winds and a nip-and-tuck challenge by Billy Casper Jr. to win the Atlanta Open golf tournament Sunday with a final round two-over-par 74 and a 284 total.

Boros pocketed \$3,500 first prize money plus a bonus of \$5,000 as a repeat winner of the event which formerly was held in other cities.

He carried a two-stroke lead into the final round over runner-up Casper and two other young pros, Ernie Vossler and Bob Watson. Casper finished with 286.

Vossler and Watson faltered to 291 and 290 respectively and only Casper was a contender at the close.
