### THE MARKETS

#### High Prices for Cheese and Butter.

The Montreal Gazette reports that the excitement in the market continues. Business was done over the cable at 11c for westerns, and 11 1/8 for easterns, while one line of 5,000 boxes easterns, comprising July and August chiefly the latter, sold at 11c. At the wharf, on Monday morning, 7,000 and 8,000 cheese were disposed of, and 10 3/4 to 11c was the ruling price, and in the case of some inferior lots prices ranged down to 10-14c. This is an advance of over a full cent since last Monday, and to say that it is entirely due to speculation is absurd. Of course speculative buying has had a great deal to do with it, but the drought in Great Britain is the primary cause of the current high prices. The Liverpool cable advanced another sixpence to 51s 6d for colored, and 30s 6d for white.

As for butter, the market shows a turn to more steadiness though the actual change is slight. At the boat, on Monday, creamery sold all the way from 20 1/2 to 21 1/2, from first hands, which of course means an advance for dealing between traders. Western dairy in shipping lots was firm at 15 1/2 to 16 1/2. Local jobbing trade is quiet; creamery, 21 1/2 to 22c; Townships dairy, 17c to 17 1/2 and western, 16 to 16 1/2.

#### PROVISIONS.

The following are the quotations in Montreal: Heavy Canadian short cut mess pork, \$16; short cut back, \$15.50; selected heavy short cut boneless mess; \$16.50; and heavy long cut mess \$15.00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 7c to 7 1/2c per lb; and compound refined, at 5 1/2 to 5 3/4c per lb. Hams, 12c to 13 1/2c per lb; and bacon 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb.

There was a weaker feeling in the Liverpool provision market for bacon and prices declined 6d. Prime western pork, 50s; prime western lard 27s 6d; American refined lard, 28s 3d; long cut light bacon, 32s 6d; long cut heavy, 32s; short cut, heavy, 30s; Australian tallow, 25s 3d; American, good to fine, 24s.

#### Live Hogs.

In Montreal live hogs meet with a good demand at 4c to 5c per lb., weighed off cars.

#### Fast Freight Train.

Toronto, Aug 30.—Following the establishment of the imperial limited fast passenger train, the Canadian Pacific railway are about to inaugurate a fast freight service to the Pacific Coast and Kootenay, freight to be carried on the train to be known as the Pacific Coast bullet, which will run from Fort William to Laggan in 93 hours 53 minutes, and to Kootenay Landing in 101 hours and 10 minutes. The railway is also arranging a similar service for the Pacific division.

### HISTORIC SITE OF HOTEL CECIL.

Many Canadians sojourning in London have made the palatial Hotel Cecil their headquarters this summer; it may be of interest to point out the fact that the ground on which its grandeur is reared is intimately connected with some of the most important historical happenings in the United Kingdom. The two and a half acres upon which it stands were once part of the estate of the Salisbury family, of which the present premier of Great Britain is the living head. The surname of the Salisbury family is Cecil; hence the name of the Hotel.

Queen Elizabeth passed along its site on her journey to St. Paul's Cathedral to give thanks for the destruction of the Spanish Armada. Many a prisoner has been taken to the Tower, along the historic Strand, which runs on one side of the Hotel Cecil, and many another by water, on the Thames, which runs along another facade of the hotel. Many a royal pageant, many a triumphal procession, has crossed the vicinity. Some of the most bloody riots that London has ever witnessed in the centuries of her history, have circled around this spot. The lights and shadows of a great city have flickered here, and to the retrospective mind a sojourn at the Hotel Cecil is fraught with fancy.

In the centre of the largest city in the world, with the business hum of teeming millions in one's ears, it is hard to picture the strip of land which lies between the Strand and the river, dotted with the villas of noblemen of Queen Elizabeth's time. How different in this Victorian era. The picturesque Northumberland gardens occupy a portion of it, and the Hotel Cecil occupies another, and instead of the mud and slush which bounded the Thames but a few years ago, that beautiful sweep of masonry known as the Thames Embankment, delights the eye. For those who visit London, the Cecil is an ideal hotel in an ideal spot.
