The Liquor Question.

The liquor question is at present a prominent issue in many of the Western States. The Minnesota Legislature has just passed a high license bill providing for a fee of \$1,000 for cities and towns of 10,000 population or over, and \$500 for smaller places. The Dakota Council has defeated a bill giving incorporated cities exclusive control of the liquor traffic within their limits, and has passed instead a local option bill. The Michigan State prohibition campaign opened in Detroit last week. The Senate and the House in Indiana are at loggerheads over the license question, and the Ohio Legislature has just killed a local option law. Although meeting with some defeats, the temperance cause is making great headway.

Lord Dunraven's Resignation.

In the House of Lords a few days ago, Lord Dunraven made a personal explanation, giving the reasons which caused him to resign the Under Secretaryship for the Colonies. He said his action was principally caused by consideration of public economy. He differed with the Government on colonial questions, but he did not resign on that account. The ministerial action on the fisheries dispute between the United States and Canada had not influenced him, for he agreed with the Government in the course it had pursued, but he strongly disapproved of the action taken in another matter of colonial policy. The position taken by the Government in the Newfoundland fisheries he did not approve of, as well as in other points of colonial policy. He disapproved of the course being adopted towards Ireland. That country needed liberal measures and a proper system of county government. But above all there should be a rigid economy in the public expenditures. The Marquis of Salisbury replied humorously to Lord Dunraven's explanations.

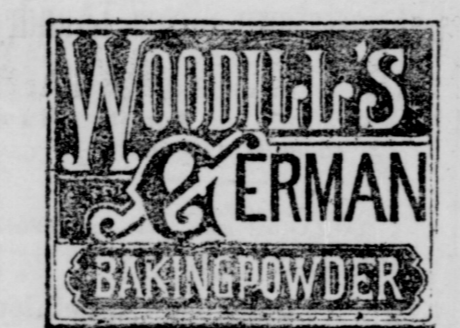
