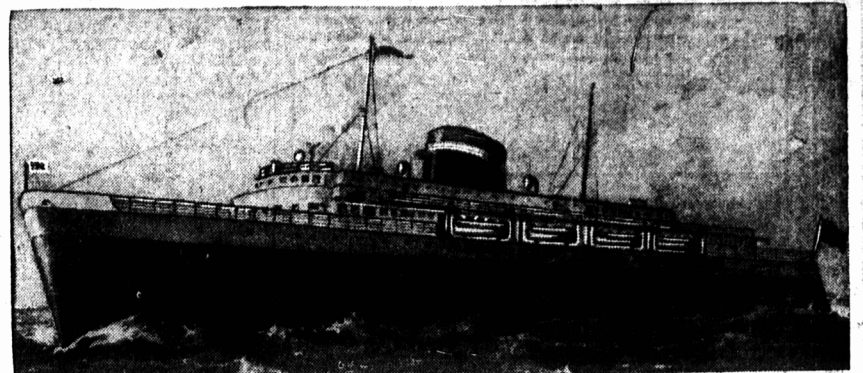

NEW INTERNATIONAL FERRY — This artist's sketch shows the new car ferry which will ply between Yarmouth, N.S., and Bar Harbour, Me. Now being built for the Nova Scotia and Federal Governments by Davie Shipbuilding Limited at Lauzon, Que., it will be operated by the Canadian National Railways. The vessel will have six decks and will accommodate 600 passengers and 150 vehicles. Propelled by six twin-screw diesel engines, its speed will be 18 1/2 knots, permitting a round trip in daylight hours. Overall length of the ferry will be 345 feet and the main deck moulded breadth 65 feet. Passenger accommodation includes day cabins, main, observation and ladies' lounges, children's playroom, dining room seating 114 persons, a lunch counter and news stand.

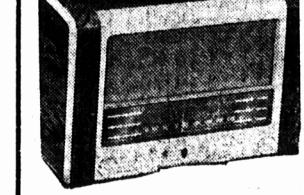
