Easter Seals Campaign Possibly Best In Nation

The program for the disabled children and adults of Canada was discussed Monday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club of Charlottetown by A. Lorne Campbell, QC, of Winnipeg. Mr. Campbell, president of the Canadian Rehabilitation Council of the Atlantic provinces, said that the \$13,526 raised during the Easter Seals campaign by the Rotary Club is not only a provincial record but is "probably the greatest increase percentage-wise of any province in Canada." He said the campaign conducted in P.E.I. was worthy of special praise.

The Rehabilitation Council coordinates work done in the Canadian provinces among disabled persons whether the financing for such rehabilitation is done by governments, combinations of governments and groups or by special groups alone, such as the Rotary Club. Its work is financed jointly by Easter Seals campaigns and by the March of Dimes. A national seminar on rehabilitation is planned for Saskatoon next September.

With provincial governments participating more and more in such work Mr. Campbell felt a joint board comprising various charitable organizations and governments should be created and administered by a lay board of directors.

Mr. Campbell was introduced by chairman, Dr. Todor Gencheff, and was followed by another guest, Dr. Keith Armstrong, national executive director of the CRCAD. Another of the guests at the luncheon was Lincoln Dewar of the Polio-miellitis Foundation of Prince Edward Island.

Wheelchair Donations Mark Red Cross Day

Twelve wheelchairs were presented to Mrs. Helen Bolger, provincial chairman of home services, by Mary Helen Ross, Parkdale Junior High School, Saturday which was proclaimed World Red Cross Day in celebration of the birthday of Henri Dunant, founder of the Red Cross.

An area council meeting was held at the Charlottetown YMCA with representatives from high school councils and their teacher sponsors attending the day long sessions. The program consisted of discussions, presentations, bowling and films.

Buying wheelchairs for loan cupboards throughout Canada was this year's special national project. The money for the chairs was raised by students in elementary and high schools.

A national essay contest for high school students in grades 10-13 entitled "Red Cross's Youth — Tomorrow's Strength Today" was sponsored by the Red Cross. The provincial winners, Sharon Ann Robertson and Louise Arseneault both of Miscouche Regional High School were presented with watches by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, vice-president of provincial Red Cross. The watches were donated by the Swiss Watch Makers Association in keeping with the fact that Mr. Dunant was born in Switzerland.

HOLD DISCUSSIONS — The presentations were followed with a discussion on the setup of Junior Red Cross Councils in the High School. Noon recreation consisted of bowling.

In the afternoon the delegates were shown a film on how Red Cross Funds are used to promote international understanding. The afternoon was spent in preparation for International Cooperation Year during which time the students will spend a certain number of hours studying foreign countries being helped through the Red Cross and exchanging tapes, letters etc. with students in these countries.

The whole preparation is leading up to Rendezvous '67 when foreign students will come here as guests of Red Cross members.

The day's activities were arranged by Mrs. W. W. Reid, Barbara Moreside of Queen Charlotte High School and Connie Cullen of Birchwood High School.
