Three In S'side Hospital After Cars Collide

As the result of a head-on collision between two cars yesterday morning about 7:30, three persons are in Prince County Hospital. The accident took place near the Bedouque school, just past Bowness Corner, when a car driven by Mr. Don MacPherson of Summerside, employed on the M.V. Abegweit and another car driven by Mr. John Smallwood, also employed on the Abegweit, met in a narrow cutting on a blind curve.

The pavement at this point was covered with ice and neither car was able to stop in time to prevent the collision.

Mr. MacPherson was the only occupant of his car. In the car driven by Mr. Smallwood, was his mother-in-law, Mrs. Stanley Jack. Both cars were badly damaged, and the victims were taken to the Prince County Hospital by ambulance.

The attending physician said last night that the condition of Mr. Jack was just about the same, and that until X-rays are taken the extent of her injuries could not be determined.

Up for second reading, the committee stage where the members have an opportunity of discussing the bills were amendments to The Public Service Act, The Bailment Proceedings Act, The Bulk Sales Act, The Conditional Sales Act, The Court Costs Act, The Statute Law, The Fire Prevention Act, The Plant Disease Eradication Act, The Temperance Act, An Act to Incorporate Prince Edward Island Potato Growers Association on which progress was reported to Mr. Speaker and the House will consider again at a later date. The Prince Edward Island Medical Act, The Summer Incorporation Act, An Act to Incorporate the Mount Stewart Strawberry Growers Exchange Ltd., An Act to Incorporate R. T. Holman Ltd.

Medical Act

While acting as promoter of the P. E. I. Medical Act Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan related some of the hardships encountered by members of the profession who might emigrate from Europe and find themselves unable to practice in this country. He cited the case of one such doctor discovered working as an orderly in a hospital and remarked that it was learned that he knew a great deal more than some of the physicians under Others holding high degrees in the profession were also forbidden to practice in Canada due to regulations, some of them the promoter stated had been teachers in medical colleges of Europe and were widely known for their ability.

He paid a high tribute to Dr. Wendall MacDonald of this City for his wonderful work in the field of cancer and jokingly remarked that the Legislature had heard "three MacDonalds talking in here but the doctor is as good as the three put together."

In discussing lip cancer he said that in his time he had probably operated on 100 patients for that type of the disease and in a humorous reference to interruptions during his talk he suggested that "it would like to do a few more."

Let's Talk It Over

Our attorney-general, speaking in the House in Charlottetown last week expressed the belief that students of today cannot read, write nor spell as well as those of yester-years, and that other subjects such as history were better taught in days of old. We have the highest respect for the opinions of our attorney-general. Even legally-trained minds do occasionally make mistakes, however, and as we are, and have been, for some years, in a position to observe results in school work, we hope you will not think it presumption if we give our impressions of school conditions now as compared with those of twenty, or even thirty years ago.

The attorney-general cites the fact that a number of students with whom he came in contact were deficient in spelling ability as evidence that this condition is general throughout the province. Now everybody knows that you can't prove anything by looking at a few cases among thousands. The attorney-general would be among the first to admit that in an election contest the results of six polls out of, say 500, would not be sufficient to indicate a trend. Even the Gallup Poll which is not, at all, a forecast of the last presidential election in the United States, tries to get opinions from all over the country. I am sure, with a little trouble, we could find three strong healthy boys who began smoking at an early age, and three weaklings who never smoked, but play body would account our exhibits as proof that smoking was conducive to strength and health.

Canadian amendment to the Prevention Act, Hon. Eugene Cullen told the members in reply to questions that it was desirable to have the fire and electrical inspectors working on the one Canadian standard. He said that that standard did not apply to actual building regulations which varied from province to province.

On the matter of court costs Hon. Mr. Darby said of the Court Costs Act that formerly a person could have a jury called on payment of only \$5 and he remarked that frequently cases were settled out of court. This meant a serious financial strain on the Province and the amendment was designed to raise the cost and discourage the practice. He also told the committee that fees paid to witnesses "go back to the dark ages." Under present regulations witnesses were paid only \$2 per day with a mileage allowance of 10 cents per mile one way. The new schedule would raise the witness fee to \$4 per day with mileage set to \$4 per day.

He also stated that the fees for professional witnesses would be raised from \$4 per day to \$7. This was done, he said, because frequently professional witnesses were called to the stand when it was not desirable to have them appear so early in a case because they could not act as busy men but kept waiting around for a propitious time. Under the proposed system they will be paid more and will take their turn, like everyone else.

Following a second session last night in an attempt to clear the air by giving reading to as many bills as possible the Legislature adjourned until 11 o'clock this morning.

Grant in Main Estimates For Crapaud Creamery

OTTAWA, March 27.—(Special) Subsequent to representations made to the Department of Agriculture by J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince, a grant of \$4,688 was placed in the main parliamentary estimates to be made this year to the Crapaud Creamery Company under the Cold Storage Act.

Under the same Act, a grant of \$344 is being made to the New Glasgow Dairying Company Limited at New Glasgow, P. E. I.

While Crapaud is located within the boundaries of Queen's County, many of the patrons of the creamery company there live in Prince and made representations for the grant through Mr. MacNaught.
