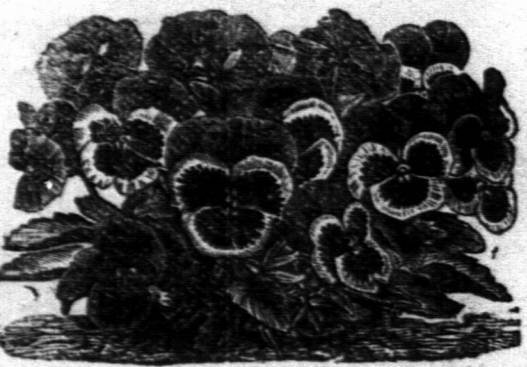

NEW ORLEANS, June 1.—An insurrection has broken out in Spanish Honduras. San Pedro was attacked and the insurgents repulsed.

His Fourth Set of Teeth.

PORTSVILLE, Pa., May 28.—Michael Fritz, of Friedensburg, the oldest man in Sunykill county, is exciting a great deal of comment. He had three sets of teeth and is likely to get a fourth. Four teeth have already grown, and there is reason to believe a full set will make their appearance.

The Alphabet in His Eyes.

PORT WORTH, May 28.—A freak of nature has come to light in the county jail. His name is Jesse Lee, aged 18 years. Turn the boy's face so that a strong light may shine into his eyes and a phenomenon is seen. Around the pupils of his eyes, in the iris, are the 26 letters of the alphabet, arranged symmetrically. There are 13 letters in each eye, those up to "M" being in the left eye and the remaining ones in the right. Lee says his father and four brothers are similarly affected.

The Engineer Killed.

CHICAGO, May 30.—The express train on the Santa Fe road was wrecked 20 miles south of Chicago last night. The engineer was killed, nine passengers seriously injured and five others slightly. The engine struck a cow, jumped the track and rolled down an embankment into the Desplaines river. The baggage car, smoker and sleeper followed. Fortunately the depth of the river was not sufficient to submerge the sleeper, and the passengers were taken out through the windows.

Exchanged \$500 for a Brick.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 30.—W. A. Thompson, a Canadian farmer of Chepstead, Ont., arrived in Buffalo this morning from New York. He was the victim of the gang of swindlers known as green goods men. He went down to New York with the understanding that he could buy \$7000 counterfeits money for \$500. He was met by one of the swindlers at Poughkeepsie, taken to New York, plunked down his \$500, saw the bogus \$7000 counted out and apparently put in a box, which he was cautioned not to open till he reached Buffalo. On arriving here he opened the box and found it to contain some paper and a piece of brick. He departed for home a sadder and wiser man, without his \$500 and his expenses to New York and back, as he deserved to be.

Liquor and Sunday at the Big Fair.

CHICAGO, May 30.—There will be no bars for the sale of liquors on the World's Fair grounds at Jackson park. There seems to have been a misapprehension on the part of a good many people in regard to this matter. The only sale of liquor is to be in restaurants, where light wines and beer may be ordered at table. Some of the directors have figured out that it would be better, from a financial point of view, to forfeit the Congressional appropriation of \$5,000,000 if it entailed closing the gates on Sunday. They say that an average of 400,000 people would visit the Fair on each Sunday in the six months it would be open. In this time there would be twenty-six Sundays, which at \$200,000 each would mean \$5,200,000. In addition, there would be the profits from the restaurants and other concessions.

The Women Victorious.

THEY WILL BE ADMITTED AS DELEGATES TO THE METHODIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED STATES.
WESTMINSTER, Md., May 30.—After two days of continuous discussion the Methodist Protestant general conference decided the question of admission of women as delegates in the affirmative. The question came up on the credentials of Mrs. Edgema F. St. John, who is a regularly ordained minister of Kansas, and came as a ministerial delegate from that conference. The victory is largely due to the eloquent speech made by Mrs. St. John. Before she spoke the majority was against the admission of women, but her speech made many converts. The opposition was led by Rev. Dr. J. T. Murray, chairman of the committee, assisted by President Lewis, of the Western Maryland college, while the champion of the women was Rev. Thomas B. Appleget, president of the New Jersey conference. The speaking was stopped by a motion for the previous question, which was the minority report of the committee favoring the women. The vote was taken by orders, the ministers voting 41 yeas against 29 nays, and the laymen 84 yeas against 20 nays. The successful side heartily sang the doxology. Mrs. St. John is the only ministerial woman delegate, but there are 141 women delegates from West Virginia, Indiana and Iowa.

Drowned at Breakfast.

A FAMILY OF SIX SWIFT AWAY BY A WATER-SPOUT.

NILES, Ohio, May 24.—A waterspout burst over Kingman, a small village 13 miles north east of this city, on the Pymatuning River, Wednesday morning, drowning six persons and destroying buildings, stock and crops. The water fell in torrents from 4 o'clock until 6 o'clock, and the small river overflowed its banks. The farmers did not flee, thinking there was no danger and all would have been safe had not a dam two miles above the village broken. J. B. Robin's house was on the brink of the river. He and his wife and two children were eating breakfast when the flood came. It is presumed they started to run, but too late. K. Stewart and son were in the barn, which was carried away. Their house withstood the torrent and Mrs. Stewart witnessed the drowning of husband and son. The bodies of the six drowned were found in the river. Many horses and cattle were swept away and the loss is estimated at \$30,000.

A Gambler's Suicide.

NICE, May 31.—It has been learned that James Walberg, said to have been from New York, shot himself in the early part of this month in the Casino at Monte Carlo. He is said to have lost all his money, about \$20,000, at the gambling tables. His suicide was kept secret by the proprietor of the place, but it finally leaked out.
