Chief Justice Palmer.

THE SUPREME COURT RENDERS A TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO THE DECEASED JUDGE AND AN EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY WITH HIS FAMILY—THE OBSEQUES—A LONG FUNERAL PROCESSION—SERVICE AT ST. PAUL'S.

The Supreme Court of this Province met at noon to-day. Justices Peters and Hensley presided. The attendance of members of the legal profession was unusually large.

The following is a record of the proceedings:— JUDGE PETERS—It is my painful duty to announce that after a long and painful illness, the Chief Justice of this Court departed this life on Sunday morning last.

JUDGE HENSLEY.—I desire to express strongly my concurrence with my colleague Mr. Justice Peters in regretting the removal by death from the Bench of this Supreme Court of the late Chief Justice, the Honorable Edward Palmer.
