

# S'ide Budget Likely To Be Presented Thursday

A letter from Mr. Lionel Massey, secretary to Governor General Vincent Massey was read at the night's meeting of the Summerside Town Council in which it was stated that His Excellency was charmed by the beauty of the town and surrounding countryside during his visit here last month.

## BUDGET THURSDAY

Fire Chief Stephen Burke outlined one of the many problems encountered by the fire brigade with the present Fire Hall which is in a most unsuitable location and barely of sufficient size to hold the new fire truck.

Both items were left over for a special meeting of the Council. In connection with the paving of Poplar Street, a petition was read from taxpayers in the area agreeing to pay part of the cost of providing curbing on the street if and when the work is carried out.

## SHALE BETTER

Coun. Leo Wood, chairman of the street committee, said that he had been advised that shale would best serve the needs of Sheen Street and Rogers Lane, rather than gravel, and said plans are to have these two streets graded after as soon as possible.

He said the streets in town have been dirty but this was due to a lot of damp weather and the excavating work being done on First Street.

Councillor R. B. Dewar, water and sewerage chairman, said his department has been very active during the past month and have installed water and sewage in several homes that previously did not have these services.

He said his department is carrying out an extension of water and sewerage facilities from Duke Street to Highland Avenue, due to new homes being erected in that area.

By placing a portable wooden sign below a window, about 7 or 8 feet from the ground on the south side of the brick building in a driveway separating it from the street, the intruder apparently used a wrecking bar to pry off the wire mesh window screen and then break through the window which opened into the main office of the store.

Once inside the store a container was obtained by tipping part of a bag of sugar into a cardboard box in a storage room at the back of the store. A few rolls of pennies taken from a cabinet in the office was the only cash stolen, and other items known to have been taken in the break, include about six cartons of cigarettes, four boxes of chocolates, 36 bottles of lemon and vanilla flavoring extract. Departure from the store was apparently made by opening the heavily barred back door at the rear of the store.
