SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES DOWN.

Make the Total Estimates Immense.

\$250,000 FOR MURRAY HARBOR RAILWAY AND BRIDGE.

The Immense Amount to Which the Estimates Total up.

OTTAWA, July 19.—The Finance Minister has brought down the supplementary estimates for the fiscal year which began the first of this month.

He asks for \$3,597,787 on capital account, and \$1,898,557 on current account, or nearly \$5,500,000 altogether.

Adding this to the main estimates it is found that the Government want the unprecipitated amount \$43,426,855 for current account, and \$8,356,099 for capital, or nearly \$52,000,000 in all.

The capital expenditures now first proposed includes \$700,000 for the Intercolonial; \$250,000 for the Prince Edward Island railway, Murray Harbor railway and Hill-borough bridge; \$500,000 for canals; \$1,200,000 for public buildings, and \$700,000 for public works in the Yukon, and \$200,000 for militia.

THE SATURDAY REVIEW

On the Alaskan Trouble—A Jingo Utterance.

LONDON July 17.—There is a recrudescence of anxiety regarding the Alaska dispute in political circles, though the general public does not attach much importance to the matter. Jingo newspapers like the Saturday Review grasped the opportunity to re-ar their anti-American proclivities. After asserting that the Canadians desire to finally decide the matter by impartial arbitration, while the United States demands a tribunal, which will be either a farce or unlikely to settle anything, The Review says:—"We cannot concede more to the United States without Canadian acquiescence, and our own experience in that direction does not give much hope of the efficiency of concessions even if we do." In conclusion, the Review remarks:—"If the Anglo-Saxon entente does nothing to modify the American attitude towards Alaska, it will have proved more useless and evanescent than the bubbles of the champagne on which it floated into existence."

AFFAIRS IN SAMOA

The Kingship to be Abolished by the Joint Commission.

It is stated in Washington in quarters intimately acquainted with the recent conduct of Samoan affairs that the abolition of the kingship in Samoa has advanced further than provisional arrangements by the Samoan Commission, and that the three Governments have so far acquiesced that the feature is assured as a part of the permanent system for the government of Samoa. It is said also that the report of the Samoan committee is likely to be unanimous so that further action by the three Governments in framing the treaty will be largely a formality.

Lord Cromer on Egypt.

Lord Cromer thus concludes his report on Egypt for 1898: For many years those who have been in any degree responsible for the management of Egyptian affairs have kept prominently before their eyes the desirability of accomplishing two main objects. One of these was to re-occupy Khartoum, the other was to store the waters of the Nile. During the past year the first of these objects was accomplished, and arrangements were made which render the execution of the second a matter of certainty within a few years.

SALE OF JULY CHEESE.

Meeting of the Cheese Board of the P. E. I Dairy Association.

A meeting of the Cheese Board of the P. E. I Dairy Association was held yesterday in the Council Chamber, for the purpose of conducting a sale of cheese, the make of the first half of July.

Salesmen representing the different factories mentioned were in attendance, and bidding began with only two buyers present, viz, Mr. Spillet of the firm of Dillon & Spillet, and Mr. A. J. Biffin.

At the third call Mr. Biffin bought the following at 8½ cents off the board:

At this point a private cable, expected earlier in the day was received. This reported the British market firmer and as a result the bidding stiffened at once. Had this cable not been delayed until the bidding was well under way it is probable the higher price would have ruled for many of the factories.

Mr. Horace Hazard arrived in time to secure the product of Hillsboro factory, 250 boxes; and Hazelbrook factory 240 boxes at 8 11-16 cents.

Mr. Spillet bought at 8 11-16 the following:—

A bid of 8½ was made for the cheese from Lakeville, Red House, Head St. Peter's and Dunstaffnage.

The following extract from the Trade Bulletin of Montreal was read to the meeting:—

"It seems impossible to get rid of the peculiar flavor which characterizes P. E. Island cheese. The Island being long, the cows feed upon a certain grass which grows along its shores and gives it a flavor of an oyster. There is a class of consumers in England, however, which likes it."

This gave rise to some indignant discussion and the secretary was instructed to write explaining the errors in the paragraph and denying the imputation contained therein.

Asked for their opinion regarding this paragraph Messrs Biffin and Spillet said that they have never had any complaint of the nature. It had sometimes happened that the cheese when kept too long was a little "off flavor."

The next meeting of the Board will take place on Tuesday the 1st of August.

The Policy in England.

LONDON, July 17.—The Times, commenting on the new Chinese fiscal reform edition says it does not expect any practical effects from it, but that it is important as a cry of distress, and as a confession that reform is necessary, which the Central Government is powerless to effect. It adds: "It is our policy by all the means at our command to keep the Chinese Government on its legs as long as possible, and to assist it to introduce any sort of reform it is capable of carrying out, but the policy may not prove feasible. It will be prudent for us to be prepared for the contingency of the collapse of the Government at Peking. The prospect is not reassuring; we must be vigilant."

London Short of Water.

LONDON, July 17.—London is threatened with a water famine. This is the latest scare, and it is causing no end of anxiety. Last summer it was bad enough in the east end, but this year the whole of London and its suburbs are threatened. The flow of the Thames is much lower than it has been for many years, and the water companies are taking more than ever from it.

A DISASTROUS CONFLAGRATION

Quebec City Suffers This Time.

OVER SIXTY HOUSES REDUCED TO ASHES.

No Deaths Reported—Estimated Loss \$125,000

QUEBEC, July 19.—Quebec was visited by a disastrous conflagration yesterday, fire destroying over sixty houses. The fire broke out in a house occupied by a family named Nadeau, a shoemaker on the corner of Richardson Street and Boulevard Langlier.

Before the firemen arrived and got to work the fire had made considerable progress.

The woodwork in the vicinity of the fire was very dry and ignited like timber. Next to the building where the fire originated was a shop full of inflammable material, varnish, oils, etc, belonging to Mr. Babeau.

Unfortunately there was a break in the water main and the supply of water, by old pipes, was very poor. A strong north east wind was blowing and the fire spread rapidly. A detachment of Royal Canadian Artillery, was called out from the Citadel and they set to work at once pulling down two houses belonging to Guay & Bourget, in order to stop the progress of the fire. At five o'clock twenty houses had been destroyed, and the fire was still raging fiercely, threatening to spread to the large Cirregregation de Notre Dame Church, (Roman Catholic) on the corner of St. Joseph and Caron Streets.

Shortly after 8 p. m. the brigade succeeded in getting the fire under control but not before it had reduced to ashes between sixty and seventy buildings. The fire covered three blocks. The loss approximately is \$125,000.

THE RAILWAY BILLS.

Pass the Senate on Small Vote. The Redistribution Bill.

OTTAWA, July 19.—In the Senate the Drummond County Railway Bill passed 35 to 16, also the G. T. R., agreement bill 33 to 13.

Sir McKenzie Bowell moved an amendment to the second reading of the Redistribution Bill, that it was inadvisable and unconstitutional to proceed with the bill until after the next census was taken.

There is no doubt from the way the amendment was received that the Bill will be thrown out.

Thunder and Lightning in New Brunswick.

TORONTO, July 19.—John Charlton appeared before the Ontario Government yesterday urging the removal of the embargo on the export of saw logs to the States.

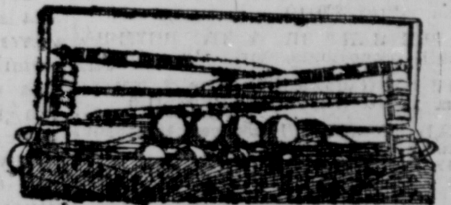
