Betting At Thorncliffe Raceway Up

TORONTO, Aug. 25 (CP) — Thorncliffe Raceway concluded their third annual 42-day summer harness racing meeting today and officers reported that the season had produced an increase of 30 per cent in wagering over 1951 with a corresponding increase in gate receipts.

Elated by the improvement in business, the directors tentatively have announced that they will boost purses again in 1953.

"The horsemen put on the show for us," said a spokesman for the track, "and we intend to share our prosperity with them as long as we are operating races."

The Canadian Cup Pace, Canada's richest harness racing purse, will be raised to \$10,000 next year. The Maple Leaf Cup for trotters will carry a value of \$5,000.

Dutch Immigrant Carving Hiitory On Ottawa Walls

OTTAWA (CP) — William Oosterhoff, a genial 57-year-old Dutch immigrant, is making his mark in Canada. And it's a mark seen by thousands of persons every year.

He's in charge of the delicate job of carving scenes from Canadian history on the stone walls of the Parliament Buildings. He took over the task in 1950 when Cleophas Soucy died and he's been at it ever since. This summer the job is rolling alone in high gear with day and night shifts in which Oosterhoff and three assistants ply hammer, chisel and pneumatic drill.

The project has been going on for 25 years while a permanent record of Canada's history and progress, of her great men and achievements, is worked into the limestone walls.

Carve Much Detail

At this stage Oosterhoff and his men are working in the central rotunda at the base of the Peace Tower where the crests of the 10 provinces and their capitals will form the central theme.

The assistants have been working on the Maritime Provinces section. Oosterhoff himself is doing smaller plaques depicting events in Quebec history. He designs the figures to be carved, but does the more difficult carving, such as faces and hands, himself.

He came to Canada in 1925 and has carved such works as the Memorial Arch at Niagara Falls, the big coat-of-arms over Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto and the crest for the Ontario Hydro Commission there.

Oosterhoff's carving career began when he was eight, using potatoes. From there it was only a matter of years until he was carving in wood, stone and metal.

He attended a sculpturing school in Holland and did work as a sculptor on the buildings of Bristol University.

Professional curiosity brought him the job in Ottawa. In 1949, he visited the Parliament Buildings and spent so much time peering at the carvings that guards became suspicious and asked him what he was doing. He explained that he was a stone carver by profession and the guard obtained his telephone number and passed it along to Soucy who was then in charge of the carving.

Soucy failed in his first attempt to hire Oosterhoff but was successful when a job in Toronto started a month later than Oosterhoff had expected. He has been working here ever since.

Oosterhoff hopes to be here a long time yet. He estimates it will take at least 20 years to complete the program.

Pinch Of Economic Recession Felt In Australia

SYDNEY AUSTRALIA, Aug. 25 (AP) — Australia's post-war boom has ended. Its end has given the Australia people the biggest shock since the Japanese came to their doorstep a decade ago.

The country is still prosperous and the people among the best fed in the world, but the change looks like a recession to Australians who thought boom times were here for keeps.

The changing conditions have brought some unemployment, a deeper concern about the future, and buttoning of pocket books.

Until a few months ago Australians were spending freely; importers, trying to meet the demand, spent hundreds of millions of pounds overseas. One result was that Australia spent \$550,000,000 (Australian) (about £1,210,000,000) more than she earned in the 1951-52 financial year.

But no longer can a store keeper, stockbroker, or auto dealer sell anything he can lay his hands on, and no longer can an employee walk out of his job, knowing he will pick up another in an hour.

Wages for a regular 40-hour week are higher today than ever before, but the general family income is less. This is because overtime work doesn't come any more as a regular thing; and wives have trouble finding part-time or full-time jobs.

Prices of some types of food such as fruit and tinned goods continue to raise, but the trend is downward for eggs and meat. Clothes, too, are cheaper as stores try to sell heavy stocks.

Canadian Dollar

MONTREAL, Aug. 25 (CP) — The United States dollar today closed at a discount of 3 27/32 per cent in terms of Canadian funds, up 1/16 from Friday's close. That is, it took 96 5/32 cents Canadian to buy 100 American. The pound sterling was \$2.67 1/2, up 1/4 from Friday.

Richards And Stengel Not On Speaking Terms

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP) — Managers Paul Richards of Chicago and Casey Stengel of New York weren't on speaking terms Thursday as the White Sox and Yankees clashed in the final of their three-game set at Yankee Stadium.

The bad feeling sprang up over Stengel's refusal to allow the White Sox to work out after Wednesday's 12-3 Chicago victory over New York.

Richards, who likes to have his charges work out after as well as before a game, had sent the clubhouse boy to Stengel Wednesday, seeking permission to take some extra batting practice at conclusion of the afternoon game.

Stengel refused and that burned up Richards. He didn't believe it at first and had to receive a second refusal before he realized that Casey wasn't kidding.

Richards got in some batting practice anyway. He hurried four of his players — outfielder Minnie Minoso, shortstop Chico Carrasquel, pitcher Chuck Stobbs and catcher Darrell Johnson — into a tax, uniform and all, and went to the Polo Grounds where they worked out for an hour.

Richards was still boiling today as he rapped Stengel for his "poor sportsmanship."

"We get permission from every club in the league to work out except here," he snapped. "Why in Boston, Yawkey (Red Sox owner Tom Yawkey) graciously consented

Race Horse Owner Seeks Damages

HAMILTON, O., Aug. 25 (AP) —

George T. Becknell, Detroit race horse owner and trainer, Friday sued the Ohio Sports Enterprises, Inc., for \$124,800 damages as an outgrowth of his charges last summer that the tail of one of his horses was tied to the starting gate during a race meeting here. Ohio Sports Enterprises operate a race meeting here.

Becknell said the tail tying incident took place a year ago today. He said the horse, Detroit Tiger, was a 4 to 5 betting favorite.

The suit claimed the horse finished out of the money and that starter Victor Swanson and an unknown man tied the horse's tail to the starting gate and thus impeded its start.

Becknell's tail-tying charges were investigated last year by the Ohio Racing Commission. They were not upheld.

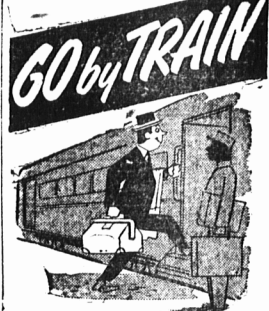
The Yankees later issued a statement saying that Richards made his request in the seventh inning of yesterday's game and "much too later to change the schedule of the grounds keeper."

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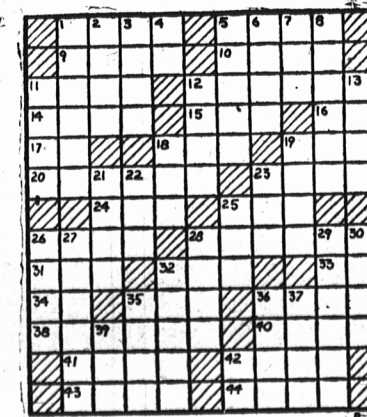
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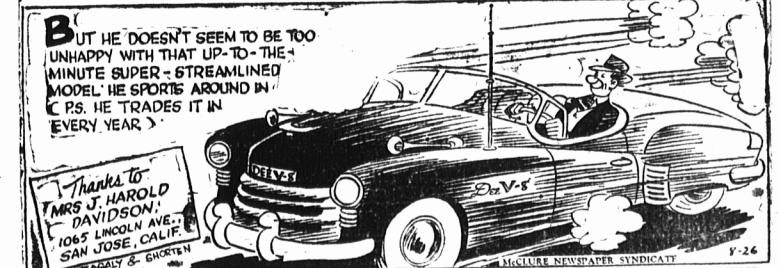
