First Sessions of Two-day Teachers Convention Yesterday At Montague

The two-day teachers convention opened at Montague yesterday morning with 93 teachers from the surrounding area in attendance.

The following committees were appointed: press, Mrs. Zita Boudreau and Mrs. John Baker; nominations, James MacBeth and Miss Mary Quinn; resolutions, Les Stuart and Grant Clements; question box, Mrs. Enid Ross and Mrs. Flora MacKay.

In his opening remarks president Joseph Scully was pleased to note that the Department of Education had been paying a good deal of attention to the resolutions passed by the Teachers' Federation. One of the notable issues brought to the department's notice was one concerning the payment of school supplements in monthly instalments.

The president strongly urged new teachers to take a more active part in the affairs of the Federation.

After his remarks president Scully introduced the guest speaker for the session, Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College.

The teachers listened attentively and appreciatively to Dr. MacKinnon's inspiring address which sparkled with delightful but very pointed anecdotes directed at the teachers to make them realize the importance of their work and their place in it.

Dr. MacKinnon stated in effect that there were three big questions that every teacher should ask herself before embarking on a new school term: (1) Why do children come to school? (2) What is a teacher's basic duty? (3) What are some of the problems that will arise during the year?

The speaker observed that many parents forget their responsibilities in regard to the education of their children and the teacher is thus left with far more to do than can

be reasonably expected of her. He explained further that children between the ages of 12 and 18 are most receptive to moral, spiritual, and secular education and the teacher's duty is that of teaching the pupils to teach themselves.

He dealt with the ways in which a teacher would be of the most help to a child. "Be humble and teach the pupil to be humble," were Dr. MacKinnon's words. A teacher who bows to the infinite scope of learning will automatically influence the pupil to do likewise. "Allow the pupil to learn initiative," he said, "for many pupils are handicapped because they have never learned responsibility." Teaching is negative as well as positive. Bad habits such as laziness, sloppy thinking, and inaccuracy must be removed from a pupil's character and replaced with forcefulness, clear thinking and precision.

MANY PROBLEMS

Dr. MacKinnon stated that there were many problems facing educationists today, chief among which are automatic grading, irresponsible endowments of high marks to pupils who do not deserve them, insufficient emphasis on basic subjects, and memorization.

He went further to say that there was grave danger in automatic grading for it caused many students to drop out of school because they were doing work too difficult for them. He reminded his audience that language is the vehicle of thought and that all subjects are interdependent, therefore a weakness in one leads to a weakness in all.

Following Dr. MacKinnon's address Miss Estelle Bowness spoke about the Junior Red Cross and urged the teachers to take a greater interest in it.

Mr. H. J. Hynes followed with an interesting and enlightening account of the C.E.A. conference at Alberta this summer.

In the absence of the supervisor of schools for the district, Mr. Louis Herring spoke briefly on school discipline and the necessity of sending in the various school reports quickly and without delay when they fall due.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Miss Estelle Bowness opened the afternoon session by presenting an interesting report of the activities of the P.E.I. Teachers Federation, mentioning the more important matters dealt with during the year.

Dr. L. W. Shaw, deputy minister of education, introduced to the teachers the new science books being used for the first time this year in grades 7-8-9-10. He stated that pupils should not be allowed to memorize facts but should learn through experimentation and the consequent stimulation of the mind.

The sessions will continue today.
