Mr. Luther Ellis, C. G. S. Cygnus, spent the week-end with his wife and family at Ellerslie.

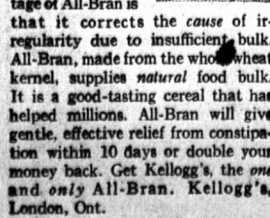

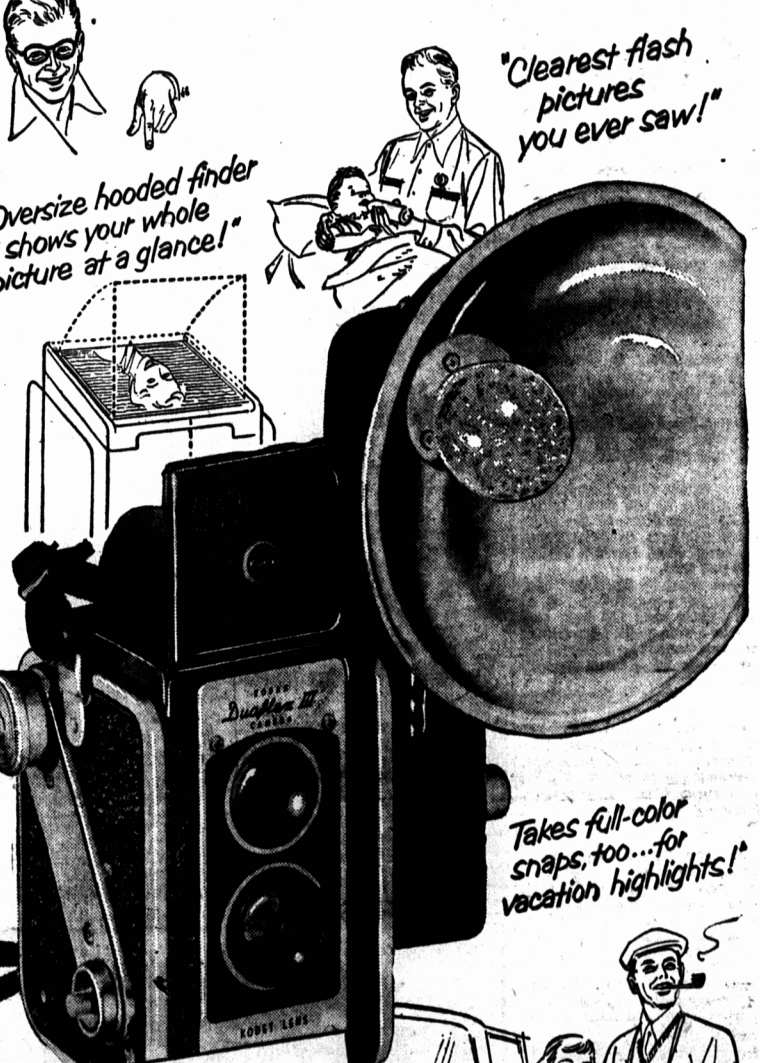
