RESUME REGULAR SCHEDULE

The double ship service provided by the Northumberland Ferries from Wood Islands to Carleton Place, N.S. resumes today with the return of the Charles A. Dunn.

TUESDAY

The preliminary hearing of Justice George J. Tweedy, charged with manslaughter in connection with the highway death of Gerald Solomon, Georgetown, on April 14, was adjourned for one week by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet yesterday evening after lengthy evidence for the Crown had been concluded.

Prior to the adjournment, Defence Counsel H.F. MacPhee, K.C. moved for a dismissal of the charge on the ground that the Crown had no case. He spoke at length on the motion.

Twelve witnesses appeared on the witness stand during the hearing yesterday which commenced about 10 A.M. and continued until nearly five o'clock in the afternoon with an hour and a half out for lunch.

The charge arose out of the death of Gerald Solomon on the Charlottetown-Montague highway about dusk on April 14 after he had been struck by a car driven by Judge Tweedy.

She is survived by two sons, Arthur in Ottawa and Regina and in Summerside, and a daughter, Mrs. Louis Romack of Beauce. A sister also survives, Mrs. Harry Spears of Saint John, N.B.

Summerside's first medical and dental clinic is expected to be ready to open in a few weeks in the former Smallman building on the corner of Water and Central Streets, now owned by Mr. Harold Gaudet. It will be located on the second floor with an entrance on Central Street and the premises are being renovated to provide the latest in this particular type of accommodation.

For the present there will be four doctors and one dentist, Dr. Vincent Grant. The doctors and their specialties are: Dr. J. C. Simpson, surgeon; Dr. A. R. Grant, surgery; Dr. J. K. A major upset in the election returns for the First District of Queen's was indicated yesterday as Judge C. St. Clair Trainor presided over the official recount requested by one of the Progressive Conservative candidates, Mr. Frank Myers who contested the seat for Assemblyman. His Liberal opponent, Hon. E. A. LePage, Minister of Education, had held an unofficial majority of one vote. In the recount yesterday Mr. Myers ended with a majority of four votes.

The recount proceedings were adjourned to Saturday morning due to the necessity of calling in the Deputy Returning Officers in Hope River and Kelly's Cross. However, it is not believed that the votes involved will make any difference in the final results as there are only two questionable ones.

Yesterday's proceedings were held in the Supreme Court room and lasted all day. Beginning in the morning, they were interrupted briefly for luncheon and supper and continued until after 10 p.m. last night before the final poll was checked. During the day many ballots were questioned by the representatives of the two parties. Those under dispute were improperly marked. Some of them had just straight lines drawn in the voting space instead of the cross required by law. Others had check marks, inverted 'V's' or other irregular signs. Many of the ballots had erasures or other indications of voters apparently changing their minds.

Dr. McDonald thoroughly enjoys helping with the inoculating clinics and encourages the parents to bring their young children to the schools to have them protected early in life against the preventable diseases, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.
