NEWS BY TELEGRAPH. Special Dispatch to the Examiner. OTTAWA, March 7. Senator Carvell has issued invitations for a dinner at the Rideau Club on the 12th inst.

LONDON, March 7. The "Astrarian," from New Orleans, landed the master and 18 of the crew of the bark "Bravelar," from New York, February 7th, for London, abandoned at sea.

Another shock of earthquake occurred at Casanaccia on Monday. Eleven more bodies were found, the latest reports show 126 killed, and 179 injured by the earthquake.

The Post says Sir Garnet Wolseley will be raised to the Peerage, in order that he may conduct and explain the new scheme of military reform in the Lords.

A dispatch from Durban says it is rumored that the Government intend to free the Cape at the end of the month, and start a free trade area.

The national line steamer "Holland," will take drafts and cavalry removed to Natal. A correspondent at Cape Coast telegraphs as follows:—

All the apprehensions of an Aahante war have ceased. The King has sent a reply saying he desires peace. He asks the delivery of fugitives but asserts that he never intended to make war, and is sorry his first message was so understood.

At a meeting of the Land League yesterday, Mr. Brennan stated that Parnell would not visit Cork, until he knew the provisions of the Land Bill.

Arrests continue in Ireland. They are generally of the farmer classes. Queen Carolina, widow of King Christian XIII., is dead.

President Brand has started for Haristwith, to negotiate with the Boers. The Postmaster General sent orders for night mails in December, and knew not until yesterday that night mails were not sent to and from St. John.

In the Senate to-day there was a generally interesting contest regarding Senator Almon's amendment to the Canada Temperance Act, the object of which is to compel the wine and liquor trade to conform to the provisions of the Act.
