NEW NOTES.—The Guardian understands that the trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist School of Charlottetown have decided to exercise the powers vested in them by their charter and to appropriate their yearly income by subsidizing certain educational institutions now existing, or to be organized, in the city. Among these are a training school for nurses under the management of the Prince Edward Island Hospital; a night school and gymnasium under the management of the Y. M. C. Association; a primary scientific, temperance and industrial school under the management of the Women's Christian Temperance Union; a day school for boys and girls under the management of the governing body of the West End school, now under the care of Miss Harvie; Sunday schools, night schools and libraries under the management of the Queen's Official Board of the Methodist Churches. They have also taken steps to institute a course of lectures by university or college professors, with class work, upon the university extension plan.

GOOD WORK.—The schooner Nutwood, Captain Theo. Lord, owned by Messrs. McLean & Co., of Souris, P. E. Island, anchored here middle of December with a cargo of 4,500 bushels potatoes, consigned to Geo. A. Pyke. The cargo was sold out here and the vessel took to a general cargo and left this port at 10 o'clock on Saturday night, 19 inst., for Souris, where she arrived early on Monday, making the passage down in 40 hours. Vessel discharged and reloaded another large cargo of oats, potatoes and pork and left Souris on Sunday afternoon last and arrived here Monday evening. She was anchored at Hawkesbury Sunday night. The actual sailing time from Souris to Halifax Harbor was 21 hours, which is most extraordinary, especially for this season of the year.—Halifax Herald.

A Great Conservative Victory.

Good News For New Year's Day.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2, 1892.

Rossmond's majority of 428 is a crushing blow to Grit hopes in the bye elections. They used every method for what it was worth. In Laska they used the sectarian cry with good success. They worked the Haggart slander, but Haggart's neighbors refused to countenance the story. They brought down Cartwright with his blue ruin and vituperation, and Preston with his boodle bugs and beer. Their shouting brigade have returned to town and are eating crow instead of turkey for New Year's dinner.

West Indian Reciprocity.

HALIFAX, Jan. 2. The publicity of the schedule of the reciprocity tariff between the United States and the British West Indies causes speculation here as to whether the West Indies' intention is to discriminate against Canada. There seems no reason to believe that such is the intention. But in such contingencies the Government here will undoubtedly take action to set matters right.

Yellow Fever.

LONDON, Jan. 2. Lord Salisbury has received a cable despatch from the British consul at Santos, confirming recent reports in regard to the terrible state of affairs growing out of ravages by yellow fever and smallpox. Eighteen captives of merchant vessels have died within two months.

Paralysis.

HALIFAX, Jan. 2. Rev. Dr. Burns had a second attack of paralysis yesterday, while making New Year's calls, but he is doing fairly well today.
