TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox and Mink Farming

There was a good turnout of faithful fox and mink ranchers to the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fur Breeders' Association, held in Charlottetown last Tuesday. Despite the disagreeable weather and the rather dismal outlook of the fur industry, all were cheerful. Many of them had been engaged in silver fox farming for over thirty years and some of them for almost forty years. In that time they had seen spectacular prices realized and had also been in eras of almost as low prices as present.

One thing that brightened the picture was the fact that the world's production today is not much more than a tenth of what it was in 1939, and the total production in Canada and the United States is less than one-tenth. As George Callbeck very sagely remarked, given a bit of an upturn in demand, silver fox can come back very quickly.

The worst body blow that the industry has received this year is an embargo on the importation of silver fox furs and other furs into France. Just why the French Government did this we cannot understand, as the French people were not great buyers of silver fox, it was the thousands of visitors from all parts of the world whose shopping place is Paris. The French designers are among the most noted in the world and for many years they have featured silver fox, in fact they were among the best friends we had. It is possible that the embargo may be lifted this fall and if so good results will become quickly apparent.
