Assessment Appeal
Board For Summerside

A resolution was passed last night at the second regular meeting of the newly elected Summerside Town Council to the effect that the Town Clerk be instructed to have prepared an amendment to the Town of Summerside Incorporation Act, 1903. The amendment will grant powers to the Town Council, in its discretion to grant or appoint an Assessment Appeal Board, to consist of three ratepayers, with the same qualifications required for a town councillor; this board to replace and assume the duties and authority presently vested in the stipendiary magistrate with regard to assessment appeals.

A second resolution approved the appointment of Mr. Joseph B. Wood as Chief Assessor for the Town of Summerside for the current year at a salary of \$800.00. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Henry W. Wedge and all councillors were present with the exception of Councillor Sheen. Councillor Morrison reporting for the Finance Committee stated that \$2,300 more had been expended on clearing the streets of snow in January and February this year than had been spent in these same two months last year. Councillor Schurman reporting for the Streets Committee referred to the work being done in clearing the streets, after the series of recent snow storms that followed each other. He stated that there are 650-700 catch basins in the town, and many of these require attention during these days of mild weather.

COUNCIL TAKES
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New Building Discussed
In the discussion regarding the proposed Federal Building, Coun. Johnstone said that at present there were approximately 600 unemployed people in Charlottetown proper, with 500 of them being males. Many of the unemployed were in the city. He said that City Police Sgt. M. W. Reardon was doing an excellent job of checking on the many families who have been applying to the Council for direct relief. Erection of the new building would aid many of these workmen who cannot find employment. Coun. Johnstone said, and in wording the resolution authorizing the Mayor to go to Ottawa he included a reference to having all service organizations in the city lend their support to the movement by passing resolutions dealing with the subject. The Police report showed that in February there were 58 arrests made and 54 convictions secured. A dog catcher employed by the week had captured 18 dogs running at large. In a further discussion of the playgrounds situation arising from a request by the Playgrounds Commission for the naming of a City Councillor to serve on the Commission it was decided to withhold until a later date the making of the customary grant of \$1,000 to the Commission. Councillor McCormac was named by the Council to serve as its representative. Among correspondence received was a letter from Miss Frances Johnson, art director, inviting the Council to attend a special showing of painting and handicrafts at the Art Centre tonight.

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Miss Estelle Bowness, present to discuss matters pertaining to business of Education Week, was asked to attend the teachers' instruction group at Easter convention to discuss with teachers, especially the less experienced ones, how Education Week programs can best be carried out. A full report from Ottawa was read regarding the struggle of the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union for better financial conditions.

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Most convincing of all that Summerside High School is a flourishing institution was the excellent display of classroom projects which, filled the large assembly hall. Carefully done illustrations, ranging from United Nations to Biology, and representing work of all grades from I to X, were displayed. It is hoped to have some of these more transportable projects on display at the Easter convention in Prince of Wales College auditorium, where teachers may see at first hand just what can be accomplished under careful and wise supervision such as that given by the Summerside teachers and supervisors.

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Mr. Alan Holman, the vice president, presided and extended the condolences of the members to President, Ben Taylor on the death of his brother who passed away several days ago. It was decided to pay the sum of \$5.00 to the Musical Festival. Congratulations were extended to Rotarian Dr. Vincent Grant on the birth of a daughter. Dr. George Bishop of Charlottetown of the Island veterinarian services was a visiting Rotarian.

The entertainment was under Rotarian C. B. Morris and the members were entertained by vocal solos by Mr. Ivor Phillips with Albert Huestis at the piano.
