The top placings in the 4H Club classes by Anne Macaulay and Myrtle MacGregor, both of East Balfic RR, were the only entries from this province which gave the club members from this province 100 per cent success.

the UN stronger if we had bigger men, stronger representatives from the countries. There would be no need to change a single comma in the charter". He cited U.S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson as the type of strength the UN needs.

There are however, difficulties in the UN at present, he explained, such as the conflict between the states of Black Africa and the white governments of South Africa, South West Africa and Southern Rhodesia.

"This is the bitterest dispute going on in the present assembly and it is such a bad time too as other countries are trying to raise the racial situation. Some countries like Scandinavia and Canada are trying, however, to find some UN way out of this mess," he said.

He mentioned the United Nations Association's policy on the membership of Communist China in the UN by saying "I think we could have more influence on Communist China inside the UN rather than outside".

Mr. Woodside also spoke of the "Decade of Development" which the UN proclaimed for the 1960s to provide countries with more effective economic aid, and the "International Operation Year" which the UN plans for 1965 to bridge the gap between nations, to begin the "1,000 steps for peace" and to make the UN a truly "international community".

In closing, Mr. Woodside told the nearly 200 guests, to support the people's section of the UN, the United Nations Association, and to aid in building peace for the world.

Mr. Woodside, known to Canadians as the voice of the Second World War situation through nightly radio broadcasts, and an expert on peace affairs, said one of the major advances in the UN has been the softening of Soviet policies since the test ban, WIDE CHASM

He recalled occasions not far past when the voice of Soviet ministers Molotov and Vishinsky led the members wondering if the world could ever be bridged.
