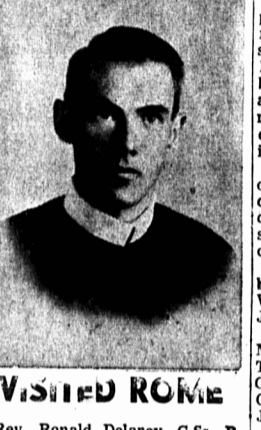

Native of India Guest Speaker - Mr. Raja Gopal, who is now teaching school at Granville, P. E. I., discussed the topic of world brotherhood in an address to the Summerside Y's Men's Club at their regular weekly meeting last evening.

Visited Rome - Rev. Ronald Delaney, C.S.S.R., Associate editor of the Madonna, monthly publication of the Redemptorists, returned to Montreal last week from an extended tour of Europe, during which time he had an audience with the Holy Father in Castle Gandolpha, the Pope's summer residence.

"DAM BUSTERS" THRILLING WAR TIME DRAMA - "The Dam Busters" is a story of science, industry and R.A.F. combining to deal a crippling blow to war-time Germany. The great dams of the Ruhr, the Moehne and Eder, supplied much of the power for the Nazi war effort and their destruction had immense value to the Allied cause.

But no ordinary bombs would burst the dams. Dr. Barnes Wallis, scientist and aircraft designer who first conceived the idea, knew that the missile would have to be launched in torpedo-like fashion from low-flying aircraft and would have to skip over the water to avoid the nets stretched across the lakes to protect the dams.

How Barnes Wallis succeeded in designing such a bomb and how the famous 617 Squadron, led by Wing-Commander Guy Gibson, V.C., conquered almost every known bombing hazard to make the operation successful is the story behind "The Dam Busters."
