

Local and Other Items.

For cheap Cottons see Young's. THE best and cheapest Dress Materials at Young's. THE income of the University of Oxford, England, is \$390,000 a year. THE market to-day was well stocked and largely attended. Sales were brisk at last prices quoted.

AMONG the forthcoming books in London are Lord Lorne's Memories of Canada and Scattered Speeches and Verses. THE Irish press and Irishman generally condemn the recent explosions on the underground railway, and assert that they were committed by enemies of the Irish cause.

FOUR women and five men, members of the Salvation Army, in full uniform, were arrested while praying on the City Hall steps, Brooklyn, recently, and they have been held for trial. THE International Labour Conference, meeting in Paris, has adopted resolutions demanding the limitation of the hours of labour and declaring that workmen emigrating should not undersell native artisans.

"THE CHRISTIAN" is the name of a monthly eight page paper published in St. John by Barnes & Co. under the auspices of the Disciples of Christ of the Maritime Provinces. THE subscription price is 50 cents per annum. Elder D. Crawford, of New Glasgow, P. E. I., is editor.

A. C. GIBBS, son of the late Senator Gibbs, is suing John Houston, manager of the Standard Bank, Toronto, claiming \$20,000 for slander. THE action is based on statements of defendant to a gentleman holding Gibbs' note that the note was not good and could not be renewed.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER has cabled to Ottawa stating that it is desired that the exhibit made by the Dominion at the Fisheries exhibition should be retained permanently in London. THE project for the establishment of a museum devoted to colonial products is considered likely to be revived.

A BOY named John Ross was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, charged with the larceny of seven dollars from Mr. George Silliphant, livery stable keeper, Grafton Street. THE evidence against him is strong, and he was remanded to jail for eight days for further examination.

SCOTT ACT—We learn that it is the intention of the temperance people to immediately enforce the Scott Act in Charlottetown and the county. WITH this object in view a number of complaints have been laid against parties for violation of the law, and in a few days they will be tried before the stipendiary Magistrate.

MR. GEORGE ROBERTSON, of Moncton, only son of the late Commissioner of Customs there, whose death was chronicled but a short time ago, died on Sunday last at his mother's residence. THIS double bereavement has caused the greatest of sympathy for Mrs. Robertson, who, within two weeks, has been rendered a widow and left childless.

WITH reference to the bestowal of the Garter on the Duke of Argyll, London Truth says: "The very close and intimate friendship which has existed for more than thirty years between Mr. Gladstone and the Duke has continued unbroken, in spite of their recent differences in politics, and no doubt the Prime Minister heartily acquiesces in Her Majesty's wish to confer this coveted distinction on his old friend and colleague."

THE St. John Sun says—Large shipments of mutton are being made from this city to Boston by the N. B. Railway. THE principal shippers are Messrs. Hays & Layden, McGrath Brothers and John McDonald. THE shipments last week amounted to between 500 and 600 carcases. THE mutton comes here from P. E. I., but later on in the season the mutton shipped will be confined chiefly to that raised in this Province. LAST winter the business proved large and remunerative and there is every prospect that it will be equally as profitable this year.

STEAMER NOTES—The Government cutter "Napoleon III." arrived here this forenoon. SHE will commence daily trips between Pictou and this port to-morrow morning. SHE has good freight capacity and good passenger accommodation. MR. Dominick D. Ryan will act as purser on board and will treat those who patronize the route with his usual geniality. THE steamer "Northern Light" will proceed to Georgetown and commence her trips to-morrow. THE "Princess of Wales" and "St. Lawrence" are both laid up at the Steam Navigation wharf, while the "Summerside" continues to make daily trips on the Shediac route.

WE regret to learn that the schooner "Emerald," Captain John McKay, of New London, struck on Monday night, the 29th ult., while going into Miramichi Harbor on the North Reef of Fox Island, and sprang a leak. HE, however, managed to get her off and anchored in the Bay, and took a tug for New Castle next morning, where he is now undergoing temporary repairs till he gets to Pictou to place his vessel on the slip. THE Captain deserves great credit for his skillful seamanship and in being able to save his vessel on such a dreadful stormy night, for had he been an inexperienced hand on that coast, no doubt his vessel would be a total loss.

DR. H. J. ROGERS of the International Throat and Lung Institute, was arrested in St. John on Thursday night at the suit of the Council of Physicians and Surgeons of New Brunswick, and held to bail in \$500 for practicing his profession without registering under the New Brunswick Act. DR. ROGERS is no quack. ON the contrary he is a distinguished physician, as will be seen by the following extract from the British Medical Directory for 1883—Rogers, Henry James, Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada, M. R. C. S., (member Royal College surgeons), England, 1852; L. R. C. P., (Licentiate Royal College physicians), Edinburgh, 1862; M. C. P. & S., Ontario, 1882; late army surgeon; author of a report of cholera epidemic at Fergusport, 1856; report to Government on the sanitary condition of the Peshawar Valley, 1858; a contributor to the Medical Times and Gazette in 1852. "During part of the time that had elapsed since I first began to practice," said the doctor, "I was brigade surgeon to Sir Sydney Cotton during the Indian mutiny." DR. ROGERS refused to give bail and remained in jail two days while the validity of the arrest was tested before Judge King. HE was discharged owing to a slight mistake in the affidavits. THE case will be re-argued. IN the meantime Dr. Rogers has entered an action against the Council for \$20,000 damages.

Local and Other Items.

THE "Northern Light" arrived from Pictou at three o'clock to-day with mails and passengers.

A CABIN passenger on board the Soythia, from Liverpool to New York, was attacked with smallpox during the voyage.

FORK is coming in quite rapidly, and the supply in the country is reported large. THE price obtained is from 4 1/2 to 6 cents per pound.

SEVERAL rocks have been discovered in the Georgian Bay, not marked in the charts, and it is thought they may be removed by nitro-glycerine.

CITY MARSH FLYNN and Policemen Steele arrived from Halifax to-day, where they have been in charge of the marine and sailor who were arrested for being away over time from the "Griffin."

AN easier feeling prevails in the Liverpool cotton market, and it is generally believed the worst has passed. MR. Ranger has filed a petition for liquidation, placing his liabilities at £1,080,000.

THE barque "Chisehnrat," from Chatham for Liverpool, before reported, ashore near the mouth of the Miramichi River, has been towed off without much injury. SHE will proceed on her voyage.

IT is stated that the Marquis Tseng will leave Paris in consequence of the statements made regarding the negotiations on the Tonquin question in the Chamber. THE Chinese Legation in Paris discredits the assertion that the policy of the Marquis is disavowed by China.

A SPLENDID line of Fancy Goods and Toys have been opened at the Diamond Bookstore; and "yet there's more to follow" in a few days, which will be the "great bonanza" for Christmas. THE Diamond Bookstore promises to be the centre of attraction during the "festive season."

COCKTAIL, an old cripple, living at Fisherton, Ont., has been arrested, charged with poisoning his young wife, Kossana Leppard, with strychnine. IT is said that just previous to marrying her, a month ago, he insured her life for a large amount. THE case was adjourned for two weeks.

SERIOUS riots occurred recently at London-derry between Orangemen and Nationalists. THE former took possession of the town hall and held it by force to prevent the Mayor of Dublin from delivering a lecture there. THE streets were patrolled by troops and police to prevent further disorder.

THIRTY thousand Arabs composed the army of the False Prophet which was defeated by Hicks Pasha. THE rout was complete, the enemy leaving behind their women, food, and animals, and eight thousand dead. THE prophet is reported to have been killed in the pursuit. THE Egyptian loss was nothing.

THE haymarket to-day was full and the stock on sale was very good. THE price did not change, sales being at forty five to fifty cents. THE stock of turnips was large. PRICE declined to thirteen and fifteen cents per bushel. OATS were in good supply and sold at a shade higher price than heretofore obtained—thirty-four cents.

THE Ottawa branch of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has donated a thanks-offering of \$250 to Rev. Dr. McKay, the missionary of the church on the Island of Formosa, to enable him to build one of the ten chapels he now needs in the prosecution of his work on the Island.

SUPREME COURT.—In the case of the Merchants Bank of Halifax vs. Peter S. McNutt, tried at Summerside, a verdict was given for the defendant. MR. Hodgson, Q. C., applied for a rule nisi to set aside this verdict on the grounds that it was contrary to evidence, the Judge's charge, and perverse. IN the McLure will case judgment was given to-day, sustaining the will and dismissing the appeal with costs.

THE Boston Comedy Company produced "Leah, the Forsaken," last evening to a full Hall. Generally speaking the play was well put on, and the different characters were well taken. MISS Grey, as Leah, acquitted herself admirably, while Mr. Webber, as the Doctor, convulsed the audience with laughter. MESSRS. Farish, Patt, and others acted very well. TO-night the Company appear in "Driven from Home, or the Christmas curse." AS the Drama is very popular we predict a large audience.

MILITARY—Lieut.-Col. Mannell, in conversation with St. John Telegrapher reported a few days ago, stated that it was the intention of the Government to have a small permanent force of infantry, numbering one hundred and fifty men, under arms, stationed at Fredericton. THE force will be established and kept up on the same basis as "A" and "B" Batteries at Quebec and Kingston. THE men forming the force will be taken from the three Maritime Provinces, and each regiment is expected to supply its quota. ON this force being established the military school at St. John will be abolished, and a school will be open the whole year round in connection with the battery at Fredericton. THIS system will meet the convenience of all classes in life who desire to attend the school. WHAT would suit the farmer, on the one hand, will not suit the mechanics on the other, as those in some occupations are enabled to get away from home during the winter season, while others find it their busiest time. EXaminations will take place as soon as the men in the school are qualified. THE officers in charge of the post will be the officials of the school. BY means of the school constituted as above, battalion and company drill and discipline can be thoroughly taught. BESIDES the advantages that will accrue to the actual military student, it is conceived that there will be many advantages to the young men who join the corps as non-commissioned officers or privates, as they will return to their homes better citizens in consequence of so joining the school. IF a young man enlists in the force with the idea that he will be usefully employed it will have the effect of making him a better citizen. IT is the German principle and Germans are far better citizens after service in the Landwehr. Col. Mannell who has just returned from Europe, said he never saw a country where farming is so artistically carried on as in Germany, and it is due to what the men learn in the ranks of their infantry.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Fatal Accident. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 6. Two men were killed yesterday morning by the falling of a coal shed. Four others were recovered badly injured, and it is feared several more are still beneath the ruins.

The Verge of Open Warfare. LONDON, Nov. 6. The British Cabinet has decided that the dispute between China and France has reached the verge of open warfare. THE lords of the admiralty have been directed to proceed at once to completely reinforce the British fleet in Chinese waters.

The Marquis and Princess Arrive Safely in London. LIVERPOOL, Nov. 6. The steamship "Sardinian" arrived from Quebec yesterday with the Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise. THE party were heartily cheered by crowds of people as they passed through the streets.

Captured by Brigands. TRAPANI, SICILY, Nov. 6. The Duke of Castel Monte has been captured by brigands while driving from his villa to this city.

A Tragedy. DEADWOOD, D. T., Nov. 6. Charles Wilton shot and killed Kitty Clyde, an actress at the Gem Theatre, yesterday evening, and then shot himself through the head. HE will probably die. Jealousy was the cause.

Sir Leonard Explains. OTTAWA, Nov. 6. Sir Leonard Tilley attributed the cotton stringency to bad management on the part of manufacturers.

Lennox Election. OTTAWA, Nov. 6. W. Allison, who was defeated in 1882, has been nominated by the Reformers of Lennox.

A Disastrous Tornado. KANSAS CITY, Nov. 6. A disastrous tornado visited Springfield yesterday afternoon. FIVE persons were killed and thirty wounded. ONE hundred houses were damaged and destroyed.

A Serious Affray. RICHMOND, Nov. 6. A serious affray occurred at Danville yesterday, whereby six negroes and two white men were killed. IT was caused by a dispute between a white man and a negro.

Destructive Fires. PORT COSTA, CAL., Nov. 6. A fire yesterday morning destroyed the business portion of the town, and eight cars loaded with wheat. LOSS, \$100,000. LONDON, Nov. 6. Fire at the saw mills of Linnear Bros. in Haggerston district is now confined to the lumber piles. THE loss will reach £30,000.
