Plus de deux mille dames françaises ont demandé la permission d'assister au procès Dreyfus, qui aura lieu le 7 aout prochain. On les a priées, poliment, mais énergiquement, de s'occuper de leur cuisine et de leurs travaux de couture et de tricotage.

Tous deux ont été sacrés évêques en 1860. Mgr. Rogers a été sacré dans la cathédrale de Charlottetown en même temps que feu Mgr. McIntyre.
