7. Spiritual baptism, and spiritual communion.

10. The duty of brotherly love; and of simplicity of life.

These "talents" have enriched the world, particularly the last. Let brotherly love continue and increase and the occasion for war will disappear.

Parents, in the training of their children, should be specially careful that they do not seek their temporal and worldly advancement at the expense of their spiritual interests. The first and all-controlling idea should be to bring up their children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." If here they fail, they make the greatest possible mistake.

THE RICHELIEU ELECTION.

A CONSERVATIVE VICTORY

The Majority Large.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. Mr. Massue, (Conservative), has been elected in Richelieu by a majority of one hundred and seventy five; more than treble Labelle's majority. There was a hard fight.

THE POISONED CANDY CASE.

Verdict Against McDonald.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 18. After a number of depositions had been read over at the inquest this afternoon, Detective Ring was recalled. He said that all the candy sent through the mail could be procured in the establishments of Thos. White and P. Kerr. In these two places candy could be got to correspond to every piece in the boxes sent to the clergymen. In Barker's store he found two styles of boxes exactly similar to those in which the poisoned candy had been sent, and in no other place in the city after thorough investigations, had he been able to procure fac simile boxes. At the evening session some additional evidence was taken, and then followed Coroner Bryman's address to the jury. He reviewed at great length the testimony given by the various witnesses, and read to the jury all the evidence of importance, arguing quite strongly against McDonald. The address occupied until after midnight, and then the jury retired to consider the verdict.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 19. At 1.45 o'clock this morning the jury returned into court, and in the presence of quite a number who had waited to hear the result, returned a verdict to the effect that Catherine H. McRae came to her death by eating poisoned candy sent through the post office to the address of Rev. Dr. McRae; and concluded as follows: "So the jurors on their oath do say that William J. McDonald did unlawfully, feloniously, and of malice aforethought, kill and murder said Catherine McRae."

Another "Jack the Ripper" Case.

HAMBURG, Oct. 18. Great excitement has been caused here by the discovery of a murder similar in details to those committed in Whitechapel, London. The body was found in the Newburg suburb of the city with her throat cut, limbs dismembered and her body mutilated. The quarter in which the crime was committed is an unwholesome one, and the other circumstances lead to the fear that the woman butcherer of London has transferred his operations to this city. The police have no information.

The Championship Series.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18. The world's championship series began here to-day between New York and Brooklyn. The latter won by a score of 12 to 10. The batteries were: New York, Keefe and Ewing; Brooklyn, Terry and Clark.

More Pleuro Pneumonia.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18. The High Commissioner's office, London, has notified the Department of Agriculture that another shipment of cattle containing a case of pleuro pneumonia, has arrived out.

Distress in Labrador.

QUEBEC, Oct. 18. Captain Lemarquand has arrived here from Point Esquimaux to acquaint the Provincial Government and Cardinal Taschereau of the pitiable condition of the Labradorians there. He was despatched by Monsigneur Bossenussongary, Bishop of Labrador.

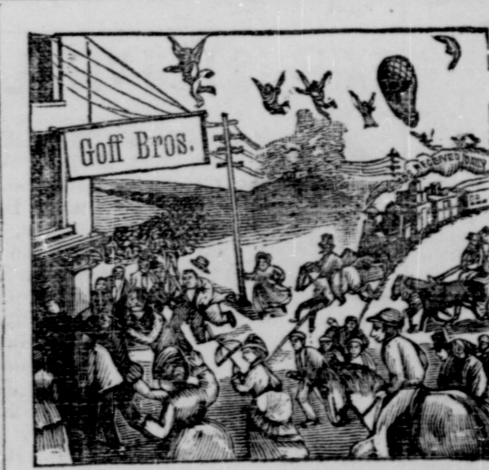
