

Safety Demands Seen Threat To Car Plants

DEARBORN, Mich. (CP)—Henry Ford II has warned there is a "definite possibility that unreasonable safety standards could force the auto industry to shut down some plants if they cannot be met."

At his annual year-end review and economic forecast, Mr. Ford called some of the 23 safety standards which United States automakers are required to build into their 1968-model cars "unreasonable, arbitrary, unnecessary and technically not feasible." He did not mention any specific requirements.

He was critical of the list of new safety features which the auto manufacturers must include on their 1968-model cars. The commerce department has until Jan. 31 to publish the safety standards in their final form.

Arjay Miller, president of the Ford Motor Co., who attended the news conference with Mr. Ford, chairman of the board, said "the government sets the rules for this industry now." Mr. Ford, in a question and answer session, also warned

that "the cost of implementing some of these requirements could price us right out of the market."

"This industry is very important to the economy of the U.S. If we have to shut down plants because we can't meet some of these requirements, then this country is going to be in real trouble."

The U.S. industry has until Jan. 31 to comment on the safety proposals. Until Wednesday the only comment auto industry spokesman made was that the 23 requirements were "laudatory but impracticable."

In his economic statement, Mr. Ford said the outlook for 1967 is "uncertain at best." However, in the long run the outlook for car and truck manufacturers is bright.

China's Red Party Paper Sees Threat From Opposition

TOKYO (AP)—Red Flag says opponents in China of Communist Party Chairman Mao Tse-tung and Lin Biao are "time bombs planted within our party" that might explode. It suggests these foes might try to seize power.

For the first time, the authoritative theoretical journal of the Chinese party says supporters of this faction "have relative superiority" in the ideological and cultural field.

The targets of the attack appear to be, among others, President Liu Shao-chi, once Mao's heir-apparent, and Teng Hsiao-ping, party general secretary.

Party propaganda chief Tao Chu, in a speech Tuesday, accused both men of following a "bourgeois reactionary line."

It appears from Red Flag's editorial that Lin and Teng are backed by many intellectuals, writers, artists, professors and students in the fight against the rigid doctrines of Mao and Defense Minister Lin, now heir-apparent to Mao's mantle.

In the editorial broadcast by Radio Peking, Red Flag appeals to the Chinese people to rise against the Liu-Teng faction.

PEOPLE HAVE CHOICE
"The masses have the power

to replace through elections or recall any election member at any time," Red Flag says. "Without such extensive democracy, it is impossible to prevent usurping of leadership of the party and the state by counter-revolutionary revisionists and impossible to prevent the changing of dictatorship of the proletariat into the dictatorship of the bourgeoisie."

The reference to time bombs and the apparent fear that the foes of Mao and Lin might try to seize power comes after Red Flag says the main targets of the current purge "are the handful of people within the party who are in authority and are taking the capitalist road."

Advantages Offered By Each House Type

If you are a prospective home buyer you may in a quandary as to what type of house will be suited for your family. The wide variety of designs available on today's market offers the home buyer the opportunity to almost select a custom built house.

In choosing the proper home it might be well to consider the following facts about the various house types offered for sale.

BUNGALOW POPULAR
The one-story house is still the most popular type of accommodation in Canada, although it is gradually losing some of its appeal to the more practical two-story home. But the bungalow also offers many advantages, the obvious one being easy access to room which are all on one level. The housewife will appreciate this during her work day. Her only climb in this type of house would be the basement stairs. Usually there are fewer accidents in a one-floor home particularly where children and elderly people are concerned.

The 1-1/2-story house provides the greater amount of floor area for the least cost. Should you require only the first floor living area at the outset, the plan also allows for future expansion by completion of the upstairs bedrooms without interfering with the exterior appearance. The one thing you should be aware of is that designs for this house

often require dormers. As dormers add to the cost, you should try to obtain a plan that allows for light through the gable ends.

FOR NARROW LOT
Many people prefer a house with an upper floor, but they may wish for more than two bedrooms. In another instance, a person may prefer a particular neighbourhood but can only find a narrow lot, once again a two-story house is the answer. It can be used to great advantage on a narrow lot where a wide frontage is impracticable. Due to its compactness the two-story house is easy to heat, and would not present the heating problems often encountered with the sprawling ranch type bungalow.

The split-level embodies some of the advantages of the bungalow and the two-story house. One welcome advantage is that there are only six or seven steps between floors which make for less strenuous stair climbing. Good zoning of family living areas is easier in a split-level home. If the lot you have chosen is a sloping one, the split-level would be most useful in solving the problems presented by this land.

It is apparent that every house has its advantages and disadvantages, but the wise buyer will consider the merits of each in relation to his family needs before making a decision on the design he should purchase.

OTTAWA (CP) — More than 100 competitors are expected to take part in the 15th annual Governor - General's Cup air rally here May 27. The Canadian Owners and Pilots Association said it will hold the rally to coincide with the opening of Rockcliffe Airport to general aviation. Rockcliffe has been a department of national defence airport since the Second World War.

MAN'S BEST FRIEND

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One factor is the known Soviet practice of concealing actual defence operations under other headings. SAIGON (AP) — The United States is making heat maps of Laos for aerial detection operations so that "we will be better prepared there than we were in Vietnam," an American military spokesman said Friday. Increased Communist activity in Laos was said to be the reason for the preparation. The heat mapping process uses infrared-type devices by which flyers can detect a hidden camp fire or even a few soldiers taking a smoke break.
