MR. TANTON REPLY

Sir,—It is gratifying to learn from you that there are "twenty-nine varieties of apples" procurable from one of our Island nurseries. As a strong advocate on protection to home industry, I say by all means give the preference to those in as far as the variety suits and can be depended on as true to name and free from disease. You evidently join issue with those who think that potatoes and fish with an Alexander apple for dessert is royal food for a P. E. Islander. There are some who have an ambition higher than this, some who would like to break the bounds of your "twenty-nine" apples, and test in this province some of the hundreds of varieties known to the nursery world. Again, apple trees, exclusively, may make a model orchard after your pattern; but the progressive fruit grower will want to plant a few of the many varieties of plum and damson trees. Others also may be so morbid in tastes as to want some cherry trees, of which there are a large number of choice named varieties. I could even introduce to you those who are so much above the social level to which you assign them that they are actually impudent enough to ask for a few roses winged, syringias deutzias, vilmorins and others of the many flowering shrubs which tend to make home pleasant. With gooseberries, black, white, and red currants, raspberries, blackberries, mayberries, juneberries, buffalo berries, logan berries, wine berries tree cranberries, plagues, and many others all of which can be had in variety, your orchard of twenty-nine apples trees would occupy a very insignificant place. Then there are more who choose to plant a few pears, apricots and nutbearing trees, and are even vicious enough to try a few grapevines. To all these the verdict of THE EXAMINER is practically—thou shalt not. I agree with you that the government should exercise precautions against the San Jose scale. It is because they have shut us out from pure stock and left us the alternative of the diseased, that I complain. There is not a line of legislation against the disease. The law simply says you must not import any stock from the United States, no matter how pure or free from disease. The Canadian nursery men may sell all the disease he chooses without restraint. The Americans, with twenty times the interest at stake, immense capital, close official inspection and facilities for purifying and fumigation, can sell stock free from inspection, and they will invariably send goods true to name. The average Canadian is too careless to observe these precautions, and as a result they are overrun with disease. I have imported from several Canadian nurseries, and there is not one out of five who will or can fill an order with stock true to name. One large nursery last year—not far from the Minister of Agriculture's own riding—sent me an invoice of about \$16.00 worth with not one article true to name. Your personal "ding" at myself might have had some force if backed up by tact and judgment in discussing the main issue. Professor Robertson is without question one of Canada's ablest and greatest benefactors. Professor Macoun, in the routine of his work is, no doubt, an efficient officer. Even on the platform he may be all that you claim for him, but my question is still open for him, Professor Robertson or for you, Mr. Editor, to answer.
