Hickey & Stewart, tobacconists, are on strike for an increase of three-quarters of a cent per pound. The Jubilee committee will meet to-night at 8 o'clock sharp. A full attendance is requested.—A. H. Macpherson, Secy. MR. W. E. EARLE, of St. John, N. B., representing J. S. Robertson & Bros., is on a business trip to the city. He is at the Osborne. The steamer Coburn arrived from Montreal this morning at 8 o'clock with a general cargo of merchandise. She leaves this evening with produce. EIGHT new members were received into full connection with the Second Methodist Church at the service last evening. The congregation was large. VICTORIA LODGE, A. F. & A. M.—Regular communication this evening, at 8 o'clock, at Masonic Hall, Water Street. Visiting brethren always welcome. MR. JAMES C. POPE, son of the late Hon. J. C. Pope, was married in Winnipeg last week to Miss Agnes Lennox, of Theford, Ont. We congratulate. THERE will be a meeting of the South End Boating Club this evening at 7.30 o'clock sharp. A full attendance is earnestly requested as business of importance will be transacted. The Irish National League of Quebec has forwarded to the Grand Treasurer the sum of \$200, being the net proceeds of the O'Brien lecture, to be sent to the evicted Luggacurran tenants. At the Synod of the Reformed Episcopal Church of Canada, held in Montreal last week, the question of union with the American church was discussed, and the prospects declared hopeful. ALL parcels sent from the Post Office to the Custom House for examination, addressed to persons residing in Charlottetown, will from this date, be delivered at the Appraiser's Office, Water Street. MR. G. H. HARRISON, who distinguished himself at the recent examination at Sackville, is the son of Rev. George Harrison, of Tryon, and not of Rev. W. Harrison, of this city, as stated in a recent issue. A LARGE number of children of the Cathedral congregation will receive First Communion at eight o'clock Mass on the Feast of Corpus Christi. Confirmation will be administered in the afternoon at 3 o'clock. Two drunks, a man and a woman, appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning. The man was fined \$2 and the woman was dismissed. A young man who was up for running over a woman some time ago, was remanded until to-morrow morning. THE brigantine Ida Mand, with part cargo of oats and potatoes shipped in Summerside, arrived here yesterday afternoon. She will finish loading at this port, and will take 11 horses on deck. The brigantine was loaded by Messrs. A. M. Wright and F. T. Newbery, and sails for the West Indies this evening. THE Vulcaniser in the dental office of Mr. Charles L. Strickland, Richmond Street, exploded shortly after four o'clock this afternoon. The report was heard across the square. Pieces of the machinery flew in all directions. The glass in the window was broken. Mr. J. C. Edson, who was working near the exploded machine was struck in the back and slightly injured. On Sunday morning last, while Sourians still slumbered and slept, Capt. William McDonald, in his little steam tug, glided safely into the harbor and cast anchor under the shelter of the Breakwater. This tiny steamer is a purchase which the Captain and his brother made lately. We understand it is their intention to purchase fish and send them to market in refrigerator cars by way of Shediac. MILITARY.—No's. 1 and 2 Batteries, G. A., and the Engineers, headed by the Artillery Brigade Band, and under the command of Capt. Passmore, paraded to the Second Methodist Church yesterday forenoon, where they were addressed by Rev. Mr. Harrison. The church was well filled. At the conclusion of the service they returned to the Drill Shed. Their appearance on parade was favorably commented upon. On Saturday last the students of the Philosophy Class of St. Dunstan's College, presented the Rev. Dr. O'Ryan with an address, accompanied by a beautiful silver mounted cane as a small token of their esteem and affection for their professor. Dr. O'Ryan, who was altogether taken by surprise, made a feeling and appropriate reply. The cane bears the following inscription: "To Rev. Dr. O'Ryan from Philosophy Class, 1887."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A Narrow Escape.

HALIFAX, June 4. The Allan Line steamer Caspian, from Baltimore for Liverpool, had a very narrow escape from being wrecked off Sambro. As she was approaching Halifax harbor in a fog yesterday morning, she struck heavily on what the captain says was a submerged wreck, but what everybody else believes was a rock, and that the rock was the south-west breaker near where the Daniel Steinmann met her fate. The Caspian struck again a second and third time, but with less violence than the first. One hour later she was making water rapidly, and by the time she reached her dock her whole forehold was filled with water.

To Resist Eviction.

DUBLIN, May 5. Michael Davitt, addressing a Nationalist meeting, urged the people to offer the utmost resistance to evictions. He declared it the duty of the manhood of the country to assemble and rebuild the houses that have been destroyed. He announced his intention of holding a meeting next Sunday of 30,000 or 40,000 men for the purpose of rebuilding.

The Frontier Commission.

LONDON, June 5. It is announced that the labors of the Afghan Frontier Commission are virtually at an end. The divergence of views between English and Russian commissioners are so great that all hope of adjusting is abandoned. Both parties have decided to refer matters to their respective governments.

The Bridge Crank.

LONDON, June 5. Lawrence Donovan, the American bridge jumper, to-day jumped from the London bridge into the Thames, merely in honor of the Queen's Jubilee. He intends to jump off Clifton suspension bridge at Bristol, the highest bridge in England.

The Thistle and the Genesta.

LONDON, June 5. On Saturday the Thistle was beaten by the Genesta and Irex in the Thames Yacht Club race. The Thistle was leading by a quarter of an hour when she ran into a calm. The other yachts kept the breeze and went ahead.

Fatally Stabbed.

MILAU, June 5. Three surveyors have been stabbed to death by members of an anarchist league, at Valguarnera, called the "Holy Land League." Other persons have been warned to expect death.

Hanlan's Arrival.

TORONTO, June 4. Hanlan arrived here to-day. He attributed his defeat to his boat, which was thoroughly unsuited for rough water, whereas Gaudaur's was especially adapted for it.

Quickest on Record.

NEW YORK, June 5. The Cunard steamer Umbria arrived at 11 a. m., making her passage from Queenstown to Fire Island in five days, 23 hours and 40 minutes; the quickest on record.

Cannibalism.

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 5. News has been received at the mission that Rev. Dr. Reid, who left last winter to become a missionary in Central Africa, has been killed and eaten by cannibals.

Trickett and Beach.

LONDON, June 5. A despatch from Sydney, Australia, says Trickett has challenged Beach to contest for the championship of the world, and that Beach has accepted.

A Combination Formed.

PANAMA, June 5. Cable messages announce that a combination has been formed in Europe by which the capital required to furnish the canal is ensured.

More Suicides.

LONDON, June 5. Two officers, said to have belonged to the United States army and navy, respectively, committed suicide at Monte Carlo.

Killed on the Rail.

MONTREAL, June 4. Mrs. Francis Trudeau, an elderly lady, was attempting to cross the track when she was struck by the train and killed.

Cardinal Gibbons.

NEW YORK, June 5. Cardinal Gibbons arrived on the Umbria last night in good health.
