with constructive planning fish marketing could be expanded ten to twenty times, and would produce satisfactory returns to our fishermen. We refer this problem to the incoming Board of Directors. While we are speaking re fishermen's problems we must voice our regret that our fishermen have suffered terrific losses in lobster traps and gear during recent severe storms. Our Government has promised aid. We trust that our fishermen members will mend and build their traps and boats and put to sea next season as before.

Sales Almost Doubled

"We have almost doubled our sales during the past year. Three of our departments, (1) butter and eggs, (2) plumbing & equipment, (3) insurance, were in the forefront stages only. Consequently these departments did not show very much net profit. By next year we expect a vastly different report. "During last season we had four locations rented to handle our business. Fortunately we were able to purchase Swift Canadian's Egg-Buttery Division in Charlottetown. This acquiring Swift's premises have the bulk of our business operation in one location. This has added greatly to efficiency and saving of labour. We feel that this consolidation of business location will save the Co-op. over \$6,000 per year in labour cost which formerly was not productive. Today we have 27 regular employees, eight part-time employees. Our weekly wages are in the vicinity of \$1800. We also have Pension Plan and Blue Cross for all regular employees who were with the Company over one year. "We have increased the number of customers in all departments. Our customers are all over the North American continent from Newfoundland to Florida, and from Sydney to Vancouver. It is our aim to build steady, satisfied customers. We feel that it is an important part of marketing operations to have a satisfied farmer on production end and also to have a satisfied receiver on the consuming end. It is not always easy to keep producer and the consumer happy at the same time. During the past season both the consumer and the producer were happy but not usually at the same time. When potatoes were \$5.80 per 75 lbs. the farmer was happy but not the consumer. But when potatoes dropped to 40c per 75 lb. sack the role was reversed. How to keep everyone in the marketing field well satisfied is indeed a thorny problem.

Potatoes and Turnips

"We have handled our largest volume of any year in potatoes and during the past season we have loaded several boat cargoes which were satisfactory. We saw this year terrific differences in price. It began last October when the highest fall price in history, \$2.50-2.75 per 75 lbs. and saw a gradual decline in price until February 15th. Then the decline became a landslide to hit a bottom of 40c per 75 lb. sack. In the process of this lightning decline many farmers and dealers were seriously hurt but we came through very well. We had no serious losses. "But one factor we must stress. This year we had far too many claims due to slow deliveries. Sometimes we feel that our local Co-ops are not on their toes in getting shipments out on time especially on a declining market. Too, too, many times we had to make hundred dollar allowances on a single cars of Potatoes. Simply because the local Co-ops were not on the "ball" in getting cars out quickly and on time. One other factor which was very much apparent was claims for shortages. This season we are supplying all our loaders, (Co-ops and otherwise) with loading charts to place in cars. We want to beat this "shortage nuisance". It is difficult to believe that our "loaders cannot count."

after very careful study the Street Committee recommended to the Council that approximately two miles be done on city streets. This was authorized. The bases of the streets are now ready and the work will be started during the hot weather of August.

Evening Banquet
At 7:00 p.m. the members assembled at the Queen Hotel where a banquet was held. Mr. Walter Shaw acted as chairman. Guests present included Hon. A. W. Matheson, Premier of the Province, Mr. R. J. McSweeney, director of marketing, Department of Agriculture, N. S., W. P. MacLeod, chief fruit and vegetable inspector. Mr. Shaw after a few opening remarks which were interspersed with humorous stories, called upon the Premier to speak. Hon. Mr. Matheson spoke briefly, and intimated how happy he was to be present at the meeting. He said that he was extremely interested in the work of the co-op movement and hoped that they could work hand in hand with the government for the good of the province as a whole. He paid tribute to one of the members, Mr. Louis McGuire of Morell, who shortly will receive a Master of Arts degree at St. Francis Xavier University. The Premier predicted that everyone could not be expected to become a member of the co-operative movement, which perhaps was a good thing since, as he put it "there is nothing like good opposition." He wished them the best of luck in all their undertakings. The special speaker for the

Larger Units
The fact that the village store is passing out of existence is not a backward movement. Mr. McSweeney said, it must give way to the larger unit. Streamlining of co-operatives, imperative as it may be, is not without danger. Control by the people is one of the corner stones of the organization and must be jealously guarded by the membership. The speaker went on to say that during prosperity there is a tendency for interest to wane in the co-operative. Even in this era of prosperity there exists a feeling of uncertainty that could even be called fear—"A fear of peace." We should not be complacent about our security but should strengthen our co-operatives so that they will be insurance against the uncertainties of the future. Mr. W. H. McEwen, general manager of Maritime Co-op Services, said that there was a tendency to forget that Co-op business is different than the conventional type of business as it is known today. He pointed out that a co-operative is a direct contrast to other business, in that its affairs are directed by the members through the stores, through the wholesaler, through the manufacturer and so on. He particularly emphasized the importance of unified action. As he put it "We have nothing to do but gain by such action." The chairman thanked the various speakers and added that the aim of the co-op should go beyond their own group, it should have the interests of the Province and of the whole country at heart. He illustrated how well this spirit was exemplified in the Scandinavian countries where the movement extended beyond the farm to industry and business of every strata.

Gravel would prepare the base sufficiently to allow chip sealing next year. This work having been thoroughly digested by the City Council at previous meetings was authorized to be proceeded with immediately. However, before the placing of any gravel on the streets the committee arranged to visit the pits from which the gravel was supplied. All City Councilors were notified of the trip and invited to be present. The Street Committee was accompanied on the inspection by five advisers who are employees of the City. Included were the City Engineer and City Clerk James Fullerton. All were very much impressed with the quality of this pit-run gravel. Following this inspection the Street Committee, on advice of the City Engineer held a meeting and decided that screened gravel placed on top of the pit-run would give a better riding surface. The process now being followed is to place the pit-run and a small amount of screened gravel is applied on top with the whole being rolled into place. This will be followed as soon as possible with a liberal coating of road oil. The latter will lay the dust and at the same time act as a binder. The chairman of the Committee stated that it is recognized of course that during this process should we get heavy rains there is bound to follow a short period of inconvenience to the travelling public. However, when the build-up is completed the base so formed will be very satisfactory for next year's chip sealing.

Sidewalks
The condition of sidewalks in the city, he said, is far from what it should be and as reported by the Street Committee to the Council the program of repairs will take at least four years to complete. This work was commenced last year in the areas bordering on Euston Street and this year has been begun on Water Street. Though the work is slow it is proceeding satisfactorily and it is hoped to have one or two additional crews joining in the work shortly. A contract has been let to M. F. Schurman Company, after calling for tenders, for new sidewalks to be laid at a price of 47 1/2 cents per foot. The price is considered a good one and the work will get underway within a short time.

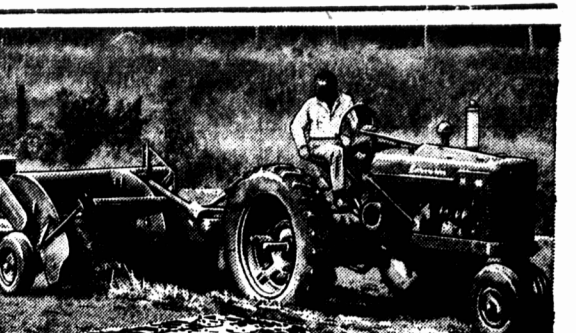
