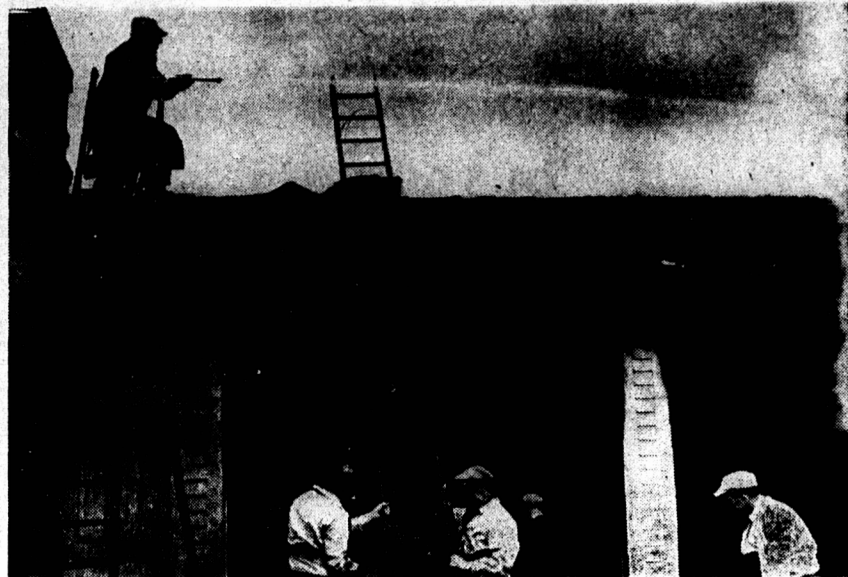

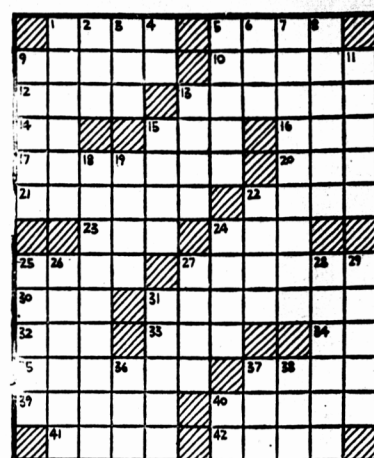

Charge Laid In Labrador Accident

OTTAWA, May 9 — (CP) — A charge of drunken driving has been laid against the civilian driver of a jeep involved in a fatal accident at Goose Bay airport April 27, Defence Minister Claxton said Tuesday in the Commons.

Replying to a question by Gordon Higgins (PC — St. John's East), Mr. Claxton said that about 11 p.m. April 27 two civilian employees of a contractor were driving in a jeep and had an altercation with some United States army men at one of the barracks or mess halls occupied by them.

The civilians appeared to drive to the danger of a United States policeman who shot at the jeep with his revolver with, as he says, the intention of stopping it," said Mr. Claxton. "They drove on at a high rate of speed and he pursued them and in the course of this pursuit the civilian jeep was overturned and the passenger killed although the driver was not injured. Neither was hit by the revolver fire of the United States policeman.

The accident was investigated by Canadian and United States officials, including the R.C.M.P. acting for the Provincial Government on the spot. A charge of drunken driving was laid against the civilian driver.

Mr. Claxton did not name the men involved in the accident. "It is believed the victim of the accident referred to was Burton Martin of Summerside, P.E.I."
